Safety Notice



Please could we remind parents to be good role models by using paths and not walking on the driveway or cutting across the car park at school. The bend on our driveway is a blind spot for drivers and can be particularly risky for children and adults leaving Pippins. Using the paths is the safest practice. The children have been reminded that they should walk in and out of school, staying with their parents. We

would also like to remind parents that there should be no parents' cars on site between 8.30am and 4.30pm. Thank you for helping us keep your children safe.

Lateness

Our school day starts promptly at 8.45am. Whilst we appreciate that the majority of children arrive before this time, any children who are late arriving can miss out on the first task of the day, and often unsettle the class as a result. Lateness after the registers are taken is classed by the Department for Education as unauthorised absence.

Thank you for your support in instilling a regular routine to ensure children are punctual for school.

Year 5 and 6 Trip to Windsor Castle

2nd October 2025

What a privilege to witness the Changing of the Guard Ceremony! With a throng of people of all nationalities lining the town of Windsor, in the distance a fait beat of a drum could be heard. As the procession drew near, the crowds fell silent. What a spectacle to see the Guards marching in perfect synchronisation! We were very proud of the way the Hope Brook children conducted themselves; one warden commented that a number of members of the public had mentioned how well behaved the children were.

Afterwards, once we'd made our way through security and offloaded our bags, we walked to St George's Chapel. All the children showed the utmost respect by remaining silent as they made their way through this historic building. As their eyes rested on the tomb of our late Queen Elizabeth II, their quiet reverence spoke more than words. The stillness carried a poignancy the meeting of youth and legacy, which brought a tear to the eye of more than one adult.

Later, after having eaten lunch, the Kingfishers' knowledge was tested in their workshop 'The Changing Power of the Monarchy'. Some of the children took on the roles of Monarch, The Pope, a Lord and a peasant. They also explored the comparison between an Absolute Monarch and a Constitutional Monarch.

We visited Queen Mary's Dolls' House and the State Apartments, including St George's Hall where the children looked up to see all the shields belonging to the Knights of the Garter. The Knights of the Garter are members of the oldest surviving national Order of Chivalry, founded by King Edward III in 1348.

Gosh, what a fantastic day! Well done Hope Brook.

Sporting Achievements


Cross Country - Team Event on 1st October.
