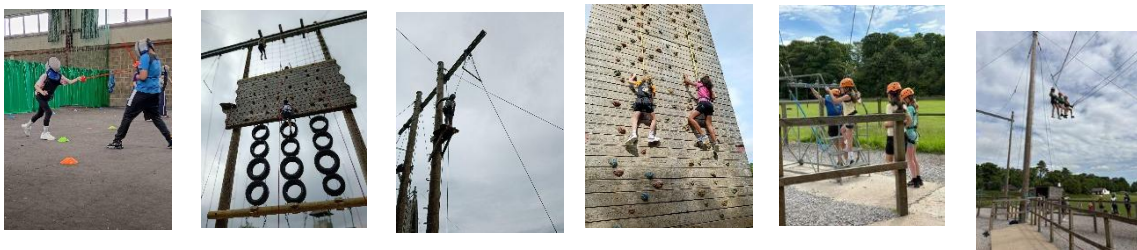


Dear Parents and Carers,

Flu Vaccine

The NHS School Age Immunisation Service are planning the roll out of the 2026 winter flu vaccination programme to all year groups. The service offers the flu vaccine between September and December. You will receive an email, with details on how to complete the online form, for your child to receive the vaccine in school.

Flu can be a very unpleasant illness for children and young people. High vaccine uptake reduces the risk of flu spreading rapidly in school settings. This helps ensure they remain well, do not miss school days and continue to learn. Vaccinating children also helps protect others who are at higher risk of getting seriously ill from flu, such as babies, anyone who's pregnant and older people.

The vaccine is given as a painless nasal spray. An alternative porcine free injection is offered to those who cannot have the nasal spray.



Vaccines offered to secondary age students during the spring and summer term include:

Human Papillomavirus (HPV)

HPV vaccine is offered to boys and girls in year 8. This vaccine protects against different types of cancers in the future.

Meningitis ACWY (MenACWY)

Meningitis vaccine is offered in year 9. This vaccine protects against four different strains of bacteria (groups A, C, W, Y) and protects against Meningitis and Sepsis (blood poisoning).

Tetanus, Diphtheria and Polio (3-in-1) booster vaccine

The 3-in-1 booster vaccine is offered in year 9. This vaccine protects against serious and potentially life-threatening diseases and provides long lasting immunity against these specific conditions.

Community clinics are available during the school holidays for missed vaccinations.

DROWNING IS ONE OF THE LEADING CAUSES OF ACCIDENTAL DEATH IN CHILDREN IN THE UK. MOST INCIDENTS ARE PREVENTABLE.

As the weather warms up, children and young people spend more time around water – at home, on days out or on holiday. Let's keep them safe.

Almost half of drownings occur during the summer months when temperatures are higher – especially when 25°C or above.

The Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) also offers a range of accessible resources to support families in understanding key water safety messages, including the 'Float to Live' technique and awareness of cold water shock - a major contributing factor in many drowning incidents. Their guidance helps parents and carers explain how floating on your back can control breathing and prevent panic if someone unexpectedly enters the water, also highlighting the physical effects of cold water immersion. Through videos, campaigns and simple step-by-step advice, the RNLI empowers families to build young people's confidence and resilience around water, ensuring they know how to respond calmly and effectively in an emergency.

Having these conversations at home can make a real difference in helping children and young people make safer choices and reduce the risk of accidents. Starting these conversations early can help young people build awareness and develop safer habits, giving them the confidence to make better choices as they grow older.

Key Points to Remember:

- Open water is very different from swimming pools - it may look calm but can be dangerous
- Never go into open water alone or without supervision
- Choose safer places to swim, such as lifeguarded beaches, pools, or designated swimming areas
- Avoid taking risks or giving in to peer pressure
- Understand the dangers of cold water shock
- Know what to do if you get into trouble e.g. Float to Live
- Know what to do if someone else is in trouble e.g. call 999, never enter the water and throw something that floats

Please remember that drowning is preventable. By working together to support, guide and educate our young people, we can empower them with the skills and awareness they need to make safer choices and stay safe around water.

WATER SAFETY ADVICE PRESS RELEASE

FAO Parents / Carers

We are deeply saddened by the recent loss of young people in open water incidents across the UK. Our thoughts are with their families, friends and all those affected.

These heartbreaking incidents are a reminder that open water can present serious risks, even when conditions appear calm or safe. Raising awareness of those risks is an important part of helping people stay safe around water.

As the weather becomes warmer, we know that many children and young people are naturally drawn to rivers, lakes, canals and other open water areas. These places can seem calm and inviting, they can also present serious and often hidden dangers.

Most drownings involving young people are preventable, yet 88% occur without adult supervision. The majority take place in everyday inland locations (84%), with risk peaking between May and August (71%). Most concerning, the National Child Mortality Database reports a 67% increase in drowning deaths among 13 to 17 year olds in recent years, highlighting the urgent need to equip young people with the knowledge and awareness to stay safe near water. *Figures provided by the Royal Life Saving Society UK*

We kindly ask for your support in speaking with your young person about the risks of swimming or playing in open water without appropriate supervision. Even strong swimmers can get into difficulty due to cold water shock, hidden currents, uneven ground and submerged hazards. It is also important to talk with your child about what to do in an emergency, including how to stay calm, float if they get into difficulty and how to call for help.

To support parents and carers, the Royal Life Saving Society UK provides a wide range of practical, easy-to-use resources designed to help families talk about water safety. These materials are age-appropriate and include guidance, videos and activities to help children and young people understand the risks of open water, build confidence and learn what to do in an emergency.

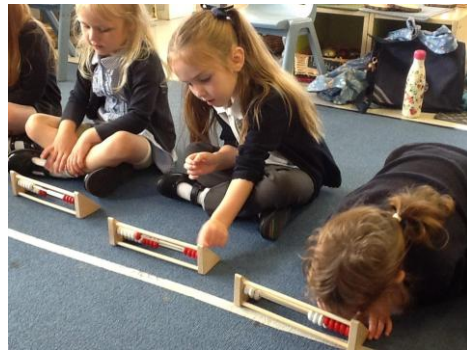

WHAT HAVE WE BEEN UP TO THIS WEEK.....

CYGNUS CLASS

This week the children have WOWed us with their story writing by retelling the story of One Plastic Bag. They have written events in order, composed simple and compound sentences and thought carefully about a range of punctuation. After each section, they've reflected and edited with their 'purple polishing pens'. They also tried very hard to form their letters correctly and used their phonic knowledge to spell. There's SO much to think about as a writer and the children really rose to the challenge to showcase how far they've come this year with their writing. We are so proud!



In Maths, we explored number bonds to 10 and used manipulatives such as cubes as well as tens frames and numicon to help with this. We represented the number bonds in different ways using pictures, cherry models and Rekenreks to show our understanding. Year I moved onto number bonds to 20 using their knowledge of bonds to 10 to work out missing numbers efficiently.

In Science the children drew and labelled the parts of a plant. Fun fact ... the trunk of a tree is like the stem of a flower. It transports water and nutrients to parts of the tree. In PE the children are enjoying athletics and practising skills that they will need to conquer the challenges on Sports Day such as throwing and catching, running and balancing. In History we learnt more about Florence Nightingale and her work and in Computing Year I continued their learning around data collection and information. Year R continued their woodwork projects designing, hammering, screwing, measuring and of course working sensibly to stay safe.



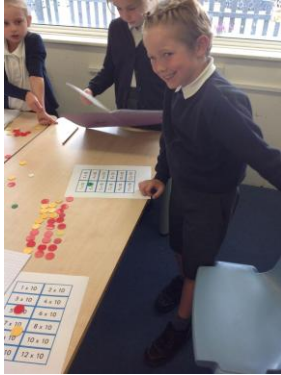
YR also enjoyed Explore and Learn time, especially the sandpit where lots of creativity and imagination was in action making sandcastles and setting up an ice cream parlour!

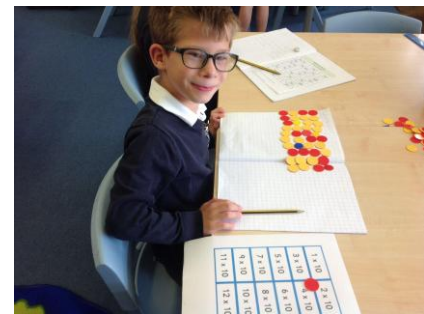
ARA CLASS

We have had another brilliant and very busy week in Ara Class, with lots of fantastic learning taking place across the curriculum.



In English, the children have been writing their own stories based on *One Plastic Bag*. They have worked incredibly hard to apply all of the knowledge and skills they have built throughout the year. The children have included past tense verbs, apostrophes for both possession and contraction, a range of punctuation, conjunctions, and a mixture of simple and compound sentences. We have been very impressed with their creativity, effort and growing confidence as writers.

In Maths, the children have continued developing their addition and subtraction skills. Year 1 have been focusing on calculations within 20, while Year 2 have been working with two-digit numbers, applying different strategies to solve problems accurately and efficiently.



In Science, we have enjoyed observing our bean and sunflower plants as they continue to grow. The children have been amazed to see how much change can happen in just one week, noticing the development of roots and, in some cases, stems and leaves growing to almost 30cm tall. They have enjoyed discussing what plants need to survive and thrive.

In History, we have been learning about Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. The children have explored the important contributions both women made to nursing and healthcare, while also considering how hospitals have changed since their time.



We also had a brilliant PE lesson this week, where we began practising our athletics skills in preparation for Sports Day. The children showed great enthusiasm and determination as they took part in a range of activities. Year 2 were also lucky enough to enjoy an additional PE lesson with Mr May, which they thoroughly enjoyed.

Well done, Ara Class, for another week of hard work, enthusiasm and excellent learning!

CONSTELLATION ROOM

This week in the Constellation Room, we have enjoyed another busy week of learning, exploring and working together.

In English, we have been reading *Commotion in the Ocean* and discovering lots of fascinating sea creatures. The children have enjoyed discussing different sea animals and using descriptive language to talk about their appearance, movements and habitats. We have been encouraging the children to share their ideas and use interesting words to describe what they can see.

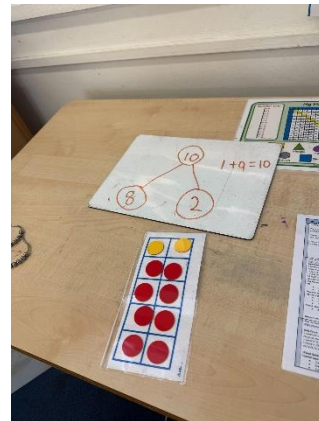
In maths, we have been focusing on number bonds. Through practical activities, games and discussions, the children have been practising recalling number bonds and exploring different ways that numbers can be combined to make a whole. We are becoming increasingly confident in recognising these important number relationships.

With the warm weather this week, we have made the most of lots of water play opportunities. The children have loved exploring, pouring, splashing and investigating how water moves through different containers and resources. Water play has encouraged cooperation, problem-solving and plenty of excitement while helping us to stay cool in the heat!

We have also continued to enjoy spending time outdoors, where the children have been engaging in imaginative play and working collaboratively with their friends. The mud kitchen has been particularly popular, inspiring creativity and communication as children create recipes, potions and delicious imaginary meals.

Our outdoor learning has also provided opportunities to develop physical skills. The children have enjoyed running, balancing and taking part in games that encourage coordination, teamwork and confidence.

It has been wonderful to see the children's enthusiasm for learning this week. We are very proud of the creativity, resilience and kindness they continue to show every day.



PEGASUS CLASS

What another busy week for Pegasus!

We finally started planning and writing our persuasive letters in English. The children used expanded noun phrases, sensory language, conjunction, words with suffixes and prefixes, and fronted adverbials to create a persuasive letter to the council about fixing the broken pier. Their writing was based on the short film, "The Lucky Dip". In addition to writing, a big focus for Pegasus is handwriting. The children have worked really hard to improve their kinetic letters and make sure it looks neat and clear.

In Maths, we focussed on statistics and reading data. The children learnt how to read a pictogram and use the key to work out how many units or items a single symbol represents (e.g. 🍎 = 5 apples). They then learnt how to read a bar graph and a table. They also had some questions to answer about each data display and practised using full sentences to answer.

PE was a lot of fun! The children continued learning squash with Mr. May. The children practised their coordination skills, including trying to jump into a moving hoop. They also had to work in pairs to bounce and catch the ball on the racket. For outdoor PE, we're doing athletics in preparation for Sports Day. We focused on relay running and passing the baton. The children got used to holding the baton whilst sprinting and passing it to another person in their group.

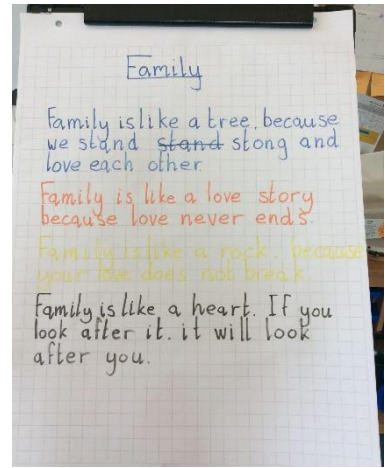


In Science, we learnt about buoyancy and why some things float and others sink. We discussed how water uses an upward force to push objects up, which causes them to float. If an object is too heavy and the force is not strong enough, then they sink. The children then got to predict and test different objects on whether they would sink or float.



In RE, we explored how families are different and what family means to us. We even created a poem as a class about what family is like to us.

To finish off the week, Pegasus got to partake in a sleepover at school. On Thursday afternoon the children did various outdoor activities such as archery, kite making, clay faces, shadow drawing and a scavenger hunt. They also sang some campfire songs and had a movie night with yummy hot chocolate.



ORION CLASS

A massive well done to Team Orion! We have absolutely smashed it this week and should all be incredibly proud of everything we have achieved. It has been a busy, exciting and memorable week packed full of learning, teamwork and fun.

In Maths, we have continued our work on angles, focusing on finding missing angles in triangles and quadrilaterals. The children have shown great perseverance and have become much more confident applying their knowledge to solve increasingly challenging problems. Towards the end of the week, we moved on to plotting and creating polygons on coordinate grids. It has been fantastic to see the children using their mathematical skills so accurately and explaining their reasoning with confidence.

In PE, we have continued developing our squash skills with Mr May. The children have worked incredibly hard to improve their control, accuracy and movement around the hall. It has been wonderful to see everyone showing determination and resilience as they practised new techniques and challenged themselves to improve each week.

One of the highlights of our week was undoubtedly our class assembly. We are so proud of every single member of Team Orion for the confidence, enthusiasm and professionalism they showed while performing in front of an audience. The children spoke clearly about everything we have learned and experienced this term, sharing many of their favourite memories and achievements. We were also treated to a fantastic performance of part of our Thriller dance. You were all perfect zombies! Miss Burns and Mrs Warland have been amazed by the effort, commitment and teamwork that went into creating such a wonderful assembly. Thank you for making us so proud.

By far the most exciting part of our week has been our sleepover and activity extravaganza! The children threw themselves into every activity with huge smiles and endless enthusiasm. We enjoyed a variety of exciting challenges and games, spent quality time together with our friends and even enjoyed a special pizza treat. To finish off the evening, we settled down to watch Wonka, which was the perfect way to end such a fantastic day.



The fun certainly did not stop there! Friday brought an entire day filled with sunshine, laughter and exciting activities. We were lucky enough to spend time with the army team, taking part in a range of challenges that encouraged teamwork, communication and perseverance.
