Curriculum Update (Long Read- as promised last week)

For parents who were with us last year, we hope you will have heard your child talking about enquiry questions, states of being, challenges. But what does that actually mean? Throughout last year, the school was trialling a new approach to our curriculum. The results from the trial were phenomenal. The buzz around school, enthusiasm for learning and connections the children made in their learning was clear. As a result, this year, the school is fully embarking on this enquiry curriculum. Curriculum Approach

We use the Curious City Curriculum which inspires and guides our teachers to create contextually relevant enquiry-led experiences. This enquiry-led approach is enabling our school to create a bespoke, locally focused curriculum that goes beyond the National Curriculum 2014.

From Foundation Stage to Year 6, pupils develop their substantive (know of) and disciplinary (know how) knowledge. They encounter curious and creative learning opportunities which are progressively planned, matched to cognitive development and expose learners to the wider world in carefully planned stages. Each enquiry is designed to provide just enough guidance whilst enabling teachers to inspire learners with local people, places and stories relevant to the school's locality. Cross-curricular learning objectives are woven into enquiries, placing an emphasis on 'being' rather than 'doing'. Our pupils are historians – they don't simply 'do' history; they are scientists – they don't just 'do' science. Enquiries allow pupils to seek answers to questions that are too big to answer straight away. In doing so, they will experience different states of being and recognise the essential links between them.

Some areas of study, including English and Maths are taught discretely and we use a number of proven, evidence-based schemes of work to provide high-quality learning experiences.

States of Being

States of Being (below) enable learners to focus on and/or combine powerful knowledge in different enquiries. Each knowledge-engaged state symbolises an aspect of the curriculum, helping learners to master both the know of and know how of a subject, not just remember it. For instance, we want our learners to be Scientists, not just learn about science. As children get older, we help them cross-pollinate states. We want learners to discover for themselves that they can be an Author, Scientist, Geographer and Philosopher at the same time and that some adults combine these states to become Archaeologists, for instance. We want our learners to see the interconnection between what they are learning and how this knowledge is applied.



Cognitive development aligned with enquiry-led learning

In a nutshell, enquiry-led learning provokes learners with key questions too big to answer in one go, but not so conceptually large that they cannot understand. The purpose is to guide learners through a scaffolded process, answering the big question with a piece of writing for example, performance or animation (what the school calls 'The Challenge'). As cognitive development, emotional literacy and language immersion underpin the Curious City approach, as well as purposeful links to mastery-led learning principles, we recognise children's awareness of the world develops as they mature and that this has a significant impact on their ability to learn. Our job is to help learners make sense of the world, not just expose them to it, by starting with what they already know, as demonstrated below.



An Enhanced Curriculum

To ensure there is complete coverage, over the course of the year, the children are provided with the opportunities to learn, apply and understand all of the matters, skills and processes for each National Curriculum subject and its relevant programme of study. Teachers prioritise use of the school's subject Progression Maps to inform their planning.

However, lessons may also feel different in our setting from the norm. Think of a child's time in school as a continuum of experiences rather than a set of lessons. Sometimes experiences are short, sharp and immersive, other times they are light-touch events over a longer period of time. This is exactly what a curious, knowledge-engaged curriculum should be. The usual Author (literacy) and Mathematicians (numeracy) teaching sequences continue, enhanced by locally rich and relevant experiences through the inclusion of significant people, places and stories, community and culture into enquiries. National Curriculum subject objectives from Science, History, Geography, Art & Design, Design and Technology, to Music are woven throughout enquiries as seen on the Whole School Enquiry Overview. Some subjects (renamed using the States of Being) are taught discreetly, such as Foreign Languages (Language Angels), Physical

Education (Complete PE), Religious Education (Oxfordshire Agreed Syllabus for RE) PSHE and SMSC (Jigsaw PSHE). Where possible, links are made but, more often than not, they are stand-alone experiences.

We place high priority on ensuring children's physical and mental wellbeing are met. We understand that children will not be successful learners unless they are emotionally secure, therefore we carefully design our curriculum to meet and respond to children's physical and mental wellbeing needs, so that they are as valued and important as academic development.

We carefully monitor children's progress with their personal development, and our well planned and thoughtful approach to SMSC (Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural) development, helps to ensure that every child is well cared for and supported.

How can I support my child?

- Ask questions rather than asking your child what they did today, ask them what they learned, what they have been (e.g. scientist), how they worked towards answering their enquiry questions.
- Support your child's learning reference the curriculum newsletters for key vocabulary and supporting books to read.
- Build on your child's learning is there somewhere you could visit locally to support the enquiry? Do you have a member of your family/friends with a profession who could talk to your child about the question? Could you visit the library to find books to support the enquiry?

Throughout the year parents will be invited into school to witness the incredible work of your children. Please keep checking Google Classrooms and newsletters for more information about these dates. We are also working on a Parent Information Evening where you will see the curriculum in action, find out more information and have the chance to ask questions - more information on this coming soon!

Attendance	If your child is not in school, you must notify us by leaving a message on our answer phone or by emailing office.2609@ladygrove-park.oxon.sch.uk before 9am on each day of their absence. Email is preferable as we are finding it increasingly hard to understand due to unclear messages and poor telephone signal. Please state clearly and concisely your child's full name, class and their reason for absence - being specific about the illness or medical needs. You must inform the school in advance by email above, if you need to take your child for an educational setting visit, religious observance or similar. Admissions to Secondary School (Academic Year 26/27)

Year 6 parents can now apply online for secondary schools and the closing date is <u>31st October 2025</u>. To ensure your child transfers to the school that you consider most appropriate, you must apply before the closing date. Remember to:

- Apply online and on time. Without an on time application you will not get an offer on national offer day on the 2nd March 2026. It will also reduce your chances of getting a place at your preferred school in the 2nd allocation. Deadline for applications is 31st October 2025.
- Addresses: If you are moving house or have recently moved please make sure you upload proof of address tenancy agreement or a contract of exchange document.
- **Preferences:** Provide more than one preference.
- Remember to add details of siblings. Please note that if you are applying for a place at DGS and have a son at St Birinus, this counts as a sibling and vice versa.


Have your circumstances changed over the summer? Your child and school may be entitled to extra funding.

How will this help my child? It will help your child to have extra equipment and resources. Applying for this funding is voluntary but if you do not apply we will not receive this extra funding which could help your child.

From April 2015, the threshold figure which forms part of the tax credit free school meal eligibility category is £16,190. Pupils whose parents/carers receive the following support payments are entitled to free school meals (assuming the parent does not receive Working Tax Credit). Under the current criteria, children who receive, or whose parents receive one or more of the following support payments are entitled to receive free school meals and eligible for two/three year old funding.

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Checking if you are eligible for any of the above is simple. All you need to do is speak to the ladies in the school office privately and we can check to see if your child is eligible using your national insurance number and date of birth.
