Welcome back after the Christmas holidays and Happy New Year. I know it seems impossible when we are suffering from a cold snap but warmer and lighter days are on the way! Until then... children can bring a change of shoes or wellies into school in the event they get wet travelling to school and so that we can go outside into the snow should there be no underlying black ice.

2026 has been announced as the 'Year of Reading' by the Department of Education and we are fully behind the idea of both celebrating reading with our children and encouraging them to become life long learners. I know you will agree that reading is an essential life skill and enables everyone who becomes a competent reader to access so many more areas of life than otherwise. This term we want to celebrate the reading journeys of our pupils and also showcase how parents/carers can support your child(ren) in developing this essential skill. In order to do this, we will follow the pattern of the Maths workshops we held last spring term. Each class will deliver an assembly to their parents/carers and this will be followed by a short talk by Miss Gibson (our English subject leader and Year 6 teacher) to help everyone understand how best to support their children with reading. 



It is against the law to ride a private e-scooter on a public road or pavement.



We understand that buying your own e-scooter can be tempting, especially as you can get them from many popular retailers.

Why is this?

E-scooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles (PLEVs), so they are treated as motor vehicles and subject to the same legal requirements, such as: MOT, Licensing, Tax, Insurance

As e-scooters do not have number plates, signalling ability and don't always have visible rear lights, they can't be used legally on the roads.

Although unable to ride your own, there is a government trial taking place in the North East where you are allowed to ride a rented e-scooter.
