

As the darker mornings and evenings begin to creep in, we reach the end of our first term—a term that has flown by! It's been a busy and productive few months as we've established new classes, structures, and routines across the school. It has been wonderful to see our learners back at school and engaged in the planned curriculum

We've also welcomed four new learners this term, bringing our total to 112 pupils—above our school's PAN of 108. We are currently oversubscribed and continue to receive consultations for places. While we are full, we remain committed to working closely with the Local Authority.

Harvest Festival and Community Involvement

This term, all classes from Key Stage 2 to 5 enjoyed our first Harvest Festival visit to Estover Church. The church community made us feel incredibly welcome, and their thoughtful, multi-sensory activities were inclusive of our pupils' needs. Thank you to everyone who contributed to our Harvest Food Bank collection—your generosity made a real difference. Thank you Rachael G for coordinating.

Learning Beyond the Classroom

A group of KS4 learners had an amazing adventure out at sea with The Island Trust, building teamwork and learning about maritime careers. PBC pupils also took part in work-related learning at Saltram House, helping with the apple harvest, and now attend a weekly inclusive sports event at the Life Centre.



A huge thank you to Katie, our Education Visits Coordinator (EVC), who organises and supports others to arrange off-site learning experiences for all classes - these opportunities really do allow our learners to apply what they learn to life.

Sporting Success

This term saw five inter-school sports events, with our teams showing great sportsmanship and enthusiasm. A special well done to 7Cann, who took first place in a football tournament for the very first time—what an achievement!

School Nursing Consultation

There are ongoing discussions about proposed changes to the School Nursing Service across special schools by the Children's Community Nursing Team (CCNT). The CCNT have consulted with Plymouth Parent Carer Voice, and a family consultation will soon follow by CCNT. I encourage all parents and carers to take part in this process so that your questions are answered and your voices are heard.

Curriculum & Assessment

Thank you to the nine families who attended our recent Curriculum & Assessment Overview workshop. Your feedback was useful in helping us refine and develop our curriculum so that it remains aspirational, learner-focused, collaborative, and progressive.

Following your feedback, we've made improvements to home reading bags to ensure these are coming home regularly—please speak to your child's class teacher if you're not yet receiving books.

A key curriculum change this year is the introduction of curriculum pathways, now defined as:

- Informal non-subject-specific learning, assessed through observations using the Engagement Model (exploration, realisation, anticipation, persistence, and initiation).
- **Semi-Formal** a balance of engagement and subject-specific learning.
- **Formal** subject-specific, adapted to meet individual needs.

Annual Reviews and EHCP Updates

This year, we are thoroughly reviewing all EHCPs to ensure each reflects the most current and accurate information. We know that, over time, the ongoing updates to EHCP Annual Reviews mean that the original and subsequent updates can become dated, making it hard to know what is current and no longer relevant.

To make these documents clearer, we're now striking through outdated details and adding new information in green text. Each year we will refine this further, ensuring it truly represents your child.

Following your feedback from the Parent Carer EHCP Annual Review Survey, we're also refining EHCP long-term outcomes to ensure they are specific, aspirational, and relevant—moving away from vague goals like "to make progress in line with their ability" towards outcomes that truly prepare our pupils for their best possible futures. Feedback to date has been overwhelmingly positive and will make these documents much more useful to all.

Partnerships and Placements

We continue to benefit from having three psychology students on placement this year—thank you for your contributions to lunchtime clubs, projects, and school initiatives. We have also partnered with Marjon University's Speech and Language Department, who are supporting us with direct and indirect communication interventions for learners, staff, and classes. Plus we are now working with MAST through Plymouth Learning Partnership. Their early work has already been very promising.

As we move into the festive season, we look forward to:


- Taking part in the Tor Bridge Partnership Remembrance Service, with pupils contributing recycled bottle poppies to a Wave of Poppies installation.

Thank you for your continued support this term. Have a restful break, and we look forward to an exciting and productive term ahead!















IS YOUR CHILD 13+?

To download and buy apps from the App Store, your child will need an Apple EL if they have used other Apple services such as KJoud, they can sign into the App Store with the same Apple ED. If they are aged 13 and under, they cannot sign up for an Apple ED on their own, but an adult can create an Apple ED on their own, but an adult can create an Apple ED for a child.

IN-APP PURCHASES

Apps are either free, paid for or free with in-app purchases. In-app purchases are optional transactions that can unlock extra functionality, virtual goods or unique content. Unless you change the settings, once your child has entered a password to make an in-app purchase, they can make additional purchases for 15 minutes without re-entering a password. This makes it extremely easy for children to accidentally run un hose bills.



LOOKALIKE APPS

Some developers release apps that copy the functionality, user interface and even product names and branding of popular apps, in an attempt to trick unsuspecting users to install them. By downloading an app from an unknown developer, your child could find their device compromised. Experts warn that through app permissions, hackers can potentially take photos using the camers and access media remotely, track your child's location, record any passwords they enter for other accounts, and send text messages

INAPPROPRIATE APPS

Some apps and games have content that is unsuitable for younger children - even the most popular or innocuous looking apps may feature adult themed content, violence or cruelty to other people or animals, unmoderated chat, pomographic or sexual content.

THIRD-PARTY APP STORES

Because the official Apple App Store has a very stringent policy about what apps it approves, children may look elsewhere for apps and games they've heard about from friends. As well as the Apple App Store for ICFS, there are hundreds of other third party app stores, but the danger is they may not apply the same level of scrutiny toward the apps they allow to be listed. There's a higher chance of app that infect devices with malicious codes or put user privacy a risk by extracting sensitive information.



Top Tips for Parents



CREATE YOUR CHILD'S ACCOUNT

You can create an Apple ID for a child under 13 and add them to your family group to keep an eye on their activity. Go to Settings > [your name] > Family Sharing > Add Family Member > Create a Child Account > Next, Enter your child's birthday and tap Next, Review the Parent Phivacy Disclosure and tap Agree. With Family Sharing, you can add up to six family members to share App Store purchases, as well as Illunes and Apola Books.

SWITCH ON 'ASK TO BUY

If you have a child that is over 13 years of age and has theil own Apple account, make sore that you only allow them to make purchases with gift cards. You can also activate the Yak to Buy feature if you are using femily Sharing, so that whenever a family member who isn't an adult initiates a new purchase, a request goes to the account organises. You can also femit what content your child can access on the devices.

RESTRICT IN-APP PURCHASES

You can restrict your child's ability to make in app purchases.
On an IOS device, open Settings, tap General and then
Restrictions. Tap 'Enable Restrictions.' You can put a limitation
that requires a password every time there is a purchase made
in the App Store or iTunes Store.

BROWSE APPS BY AGE

To find apps and games that are right for your children, check the age ratings. On an iPhone or iProd Touch, this can be found in the information section on an app's product page, and on an iProd or desktop, the age range is near the Buy button. On the Kids page, you can find apps for age ranges including a section of the product of the section.

AVOID OTHER APP STORES

Put a rule in place that your child can only use the official App Store to download apps and games. Explain why it is wise to divinital applications from a trusted source to ensure their device is not affected by security issues or virus attacks.

HOW TO KNOW AN APP IS SAFE TO INSTALL

Advise your child that just because they're downloading an app from an official store, it doesn't make it sale. Fake or copycut apps will other include misspelt words and poor grammar, so always read the app description, and double check the developer name and title for warning signs. Be wary of apps that come with a long list of permission requests, Check the app's reviews and ratings - one star, one line reviews complaining that an app didn't work on a certain device, or that there was a billion loss is not a sood indirection.

SPOT FAKE REVIEWS

When checking the customer reviews within the app store, make sure they aren't vague and generic, or overly effusive, as some developers will try to manipulate their appripositions by posting take retirent and reviews. Check the number of downloads the app claims to have the higher the number, the more likely it is to be safe. Your child car company's website to see if the app is a

'Likes' are a simple way for users to show that they like a post on social media. This could be anything from photos and videos to status updates and comments. The feature is widely used on several social media platforms and is extremely popular on Instagram and Facebook. It is often used by children to measure the success of their social media post and gauge opinion. However, it can also bring a number of social pressures, particularly if users start to question their own levels of popularity.





What parents need to know about SOCIAL PRESSURES LINKED TO 'LIKES'



DAMAGING TO SELF-ESTEEM

Your child may use likes to measure their own self-worth, with more likes instilling a greater level of confidence and acceptance amongst their friends and poers. However, children what only receive a small number may in turn feel a sense of rejection or leolation and could potentially suffer from love self-esteem issues, impacting them in other argents of their life such as at school or in social settings.



UNREAL VIEW OF THE WORLD

Your child may follow calebrities or other popular individuals on social media who receive millions of likes. Not everything on social media is a true reflection of the world and your child may help presured into behaving in a similar way in real life or poeting similar material in order to feel popular and achieve a similar level of self-worth.





AN ADDICTIVE FEATURE

Lika features encourage children to stay online for longer. In deing so, your child is likely to engage with app's for longer periods than they otherwise would have wanted, checking their phone more frequently, including at night when they should be asleep. This could contribute towards screen addiction which can cause sleep deprivation and consequently a lack or focus during the next day at school.



COMPETITIVE CULTURE

Children will offen compare the number of likes they receive for their post against their friends or followers, possibly evoking emotions of justicusty or resemberant. In a bid to increase their own status and receive more likes, this could lead to a competitive culture in which children try to better one another, potentially leading to them engaging in









Owing the Latter social models since as year child and contending with them ordine will allow you to keep an eye on what their interests are and who may be influencing them. Following their likes will help you build a picture of what your child is being exposed to and what they find interesting.



MONITOR MENTAL HEALTH

If your child does poot on social media, it is important to monitor their feelings and emotions, supporting them and encouraging them to talk to you about what they may be experiencing. Explain to them that not everything online is real and that life is not dictated by how many likes a next may or more out.



ENCOURAGE HOBBIES OR OTHER ACTIVITIES

HELP TO BUILD YOUR CHILD'S SELF-ESTEEM

Try to help build your child's self-exteen through positivity and praise and listening to them if they are struggling with the way they look or feet. Talk to them about the positive aspect of their personality and help them understand that looks aren't everything. Try not to criticise or blame your child which could compound any negative throughts they are already feeting.
