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## Together, We Cann

Merry Christmas! It has been a wonderful term at Cann Bridge. It is always a pleasure to see so many of you at this time of year as we come together to celebrate the end of what has been a very strong start to the academic year.

You may recall from my last newsletter that we appointed our very own full-time, year-round School Caretaker, Martin Barbour. I am delighted to share that Martin has recently completed his three-day Pool Plant Operator course and has been working to get the Warm Water Pool back up and running. As the pool has been closed for some time, we are incredibly pleased to have it operational again. Martin is settling in very well and is already making a positive impact across the school.

I was very pleased to attend Christ Church on Thursday 18th December with 1Cann and 2Cann (EYFS/KS1), alongside some parents and Governors, for their first Key Stage off-site educational visit of the year. The rain certainly didn't dampen spirits—apart from a brief pause for some enthusiastic puddle jumping! Rev. Tatty and Claire were wonderful hosts, and the activities were thoughtful, inclusive, and carefully planned. I was particularly impressed with their use of Makaton signing. It is fantastic to be part of such a welcoming and supportive community.



Our Winter Show was, as always, a tremendous success on Friday 12th December. The café before the show proved to be a great model and provided a captive audience for our bumper Friends of Cann Bridge raffle—although next year we will aim for a larger space so everyone can enjoy a seat and a drink! I cannot thank Friends of Cann Bridge and our wider community enough for raising over £1,400 across two days through the Christmas raffle, café, and Santa Fun Run. This term, Friends of Cann Bridge also launched their new tuck shop, now open to staff and visitors in reception—perfect for a quick refreshment before or after a meeting (I may have visited it once... or three times!).

As you will have heard, we are also planning a charitable ball. Friends of Cann Bridge are committed to raising £10,000 towards our Upper School Playground Appeal. We currently have three initial playground designs, which we will be sharing with you in the New Year to gather your feedback before finalising a design to be unveiled at the charity event. We would really appreciate your support in sharing the event details—available on our Facebook page and in this newsletter—with friends, family, and employers.

The Winter Show: A Christmas Party certainly got us all into the festive spirit. A great deal of preparation goes on behind the scenes, and the show provides so many valuable learning and developmental opportunities—from transitioning to a new venue, rehearsing, performing in front of a large audience, to showcasing learning from across the term. It is also a wonderful opportunity to come together and celebrate success. You may have noticed me capturing the event on my iPad—this allowed classes, learners not yet ready to perform, colleagues on maternity leave, and even our new Deputy Headteacher, Josie Cuffe-Fuller, who joined us virtually from Manchester, to watch along. If you were unable to attend, a short highlight reel is available on our Facebook page. Thank you to all staff who helped to make this a great success.





This term we were invited to be part of Tor Bridge High's Remembrance Service, and it was a privilege to take part in this wider campus event. Our learners truly demonstrated our can-do approach, with two pupils laying a wreath alongside other schools—making us all incredibly proud. Across the campus community, an impressive £507.13 was raised through the sale of crocheted poppies and Royal British Legion poppies. Thank you also to all pupils and staff for raising £128.92 for Children in Need this year.

I am pleased to share that our Examination and Assessment Progress Report for 2024/25 is now published on our website for those who would like some light reading. The summary provides a clear overview of progress across the school and is a very positive report. On average, pupils made more progress last year than in the previous year, demonstrating the positive impact of our new curriculum launched in September 2024. This reflects a whole-school effort, driven by our curriculum leaders, to continually refine and strengthen our approaches in order to secure the best possible outcomes for our learners.

We have now moved our swimming sessions to Plymouth College, and this arrangement is working extremely well. Sessions no longer impact lunchtimes, transport is provided via Plymouth College's minibus, and pupils are receiving high-quality tuition to support their confidence and progress in the water. Huge thanks to James, our PE Coordinator, for establishing this successful new partnership.



This term also saw fantastic enterprise and work-related learning across Key Stages 4 and 5. The Buggingham Palace bug hotels were a resounding success, alongside many other wonderful enterprise products. We now have an enterprise cabinet in reception where items can be viewed and purchased, positioned alongside our improved House Point station and awards cabinet. Thank you to everyone who supported the Christmas Enterprise Café, and to staff who supported our stall at the Tor Bridge Primary Christmas Market.

Thank you to families who took the time to respond to the NHS Children's Community Nursing Team consultation regarding proposals to remove the school nursing service from Cann Bridge and replace it with an outreach model. I am aware that at least 11 families submitted responses. Following feedback from one parent, an additional online meeting was arranged. We now await the outcome of the consultation and will share updates and next steps as soon as these are known.

At the Winter Show, I was pleased to share that in the New Year we will be investing over £10,000 of Pupil Premium funding into high-tech AAC devices. This builds on our commitment to strengthening our speech and language provision and ensuring learners have the tools they need to express their wants and needs. These will be school-based devices initially, but if successful, they will provide families with evidence to support applications for home devices, including through relevant charities. Alongside our new partnership with Marjon University Speech and Language Service, this represents a very positive step forward. Our updated Pupil Premium Strategy, informed by your feedback in the last Parent Survey, is now available on the website.



I would like to acknowledge and apologise for any lapses in communication this term as we transitioned to our new Management Information System, Bromcom. The issues experienced were part of our learning process rather than system failure. While we tested the system extensively, some technical issues only became apparent once it was in full use. These have now been resolved. If you have the MCAS app, you should be receiving all communications and notifications through it; if you do not have the app and we have your correct email address on record, communications will come via email. We will no longer be using text messages. I apologise for any inconvenience caused.

This year's Christmas tree colours were once again voted for by pupils through the School Council, with traditional red and green being the winning choice. The tree was generously donated by Arborcure and looks wonderful in our foyer. Next year, we will also be taking part in the Christ Church Christmas Tree Festival.

A huge thank you to our catering team, CaterEd, for providing a fantastic whole-school Christmas dinner for staff and learners, perfectly timed with Christmas Jumper Day and the Santa Fun Run. These are the days that truly bring our community together. You may have seen my earlier letter explaining that CaterEd's services will conclude at the end of this academic year. We are working with our partnership schools to tender for a new provider from September 2026, and I am confident that our high standards will continue when the team move over to this new service.

The House with the most points this term was Tamar, with 833 points. JJ proudly collected the trophy, and Julia organised a celebratory afternoon film—K-Pop was the film of choice! Well done to all learners for consistently demonstrating our behaviour values.

School photography took place this term with our new provider, Class Photography, and we were extremely impressed with both the photographers and the results. We have received feedback suggesting trialling alternative photographers in future years, and we will gather further views in our next Parent Survey to ensure this is a collective decision. The staff board and website are currently being updated.

Since my last newsletter, I am delighted to share that through successful bid writing, charitable donations, and fundraising, we have secured funding for our very own portable radio station. Radio Cann Bridge will launch in 2026! Having previously coordinated a school radio, I have seen first-hand the confidence and communication benefits it can bring, particularly for selective communicators. My sincere thanks to Wendy Fisher for her voluntary commitment to making this vision a reality. Wendy, who was Deputy Headteacher at Cann Bridge until 2016, shared that a school radio station had always been a dream when the school first moved to this site—so it is wonderful to see this come to fruition.

At the end of this term, we say goodbye to Karen Hunter in her role as Deputy Headteacher, and look forward to welcoming her back on 12th January as our Interim Director of Teaching, Learning & Assessment for two days per week. A huge thank you from me and the entire school community for Karen's hard work and dedication over the past 20 months. Karen is very much looking forward to spending more time in classrooms and supporting staff development - whilst also having more quality family time.

During the Christmas holidays, a range of activities have been taking place for our families:

Looking ahead to the New Year, Nikki will also be coordinating a Makaton training session for families. Further details will be shared soon.



A huge thank you to Nikki and the wider team for organising hampers, gifts, and the distribution of donations to families. Senior leaders were honoured to attend the Children's Wishes Christmas present-wrapping event—it was truly inspiring to see so many people united in making a difference. Thank you also for the many kind messages of appreciation which we have shared with staff.



As I write this, we are still looking forward to our end-of-term Christmas disco and a special visit from Santa, who will be delivering a gift to every learner thanks to funding from Friends of Cann Bridge and the incredible efforts of our staff sourcing personalised gifts for Santa to deliver.



Thank you to all parents and carers for supporting a strong attendance rate of 93.5% this term (94.8% until the final week). Your commitment ensures that children can fully access the curriculum and all that school life offers.



After the holidays, we will be introducing new mobile radios (walkie-talkies) to improve communication across the site, and all staff have been provided with a new branded T-shirt. Further investments have also been made in resources and facilities for 1Cann and 2Cann, which will be shared in more detail in the New Year as part of our School Development Plan.



Looking ahead, the New Year brings a wealth of exciting opportunities, including residential visits to Heatree (KS4) and Butlins (KS5), Ten Tors, Duke of Edinburgh, World Book Day, Careers Day, and a wide range of curriculum-linked educational visits across all Key Stages.



Our INSET Day in January we are planning to complete the NASEN Whole School SEND Awareness Training, we have the winner of Britains Got Talent 2018 Lee Ridley as a guest speaker and Dale Pickles from BSquared to share with us the importance of assessment to inform teaching and learning.



I hope you all have a truly wonderful Christmas. As I prepare to begin my fourth year at Cann Bridge in January, I remain deeply grateful for the privilege of serving such a special school community and leading such a dedicated and passionate team. Thank you for your continued support.

# What Parents & Educators Need to Know about AI TOYS

## WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

### TOYS THAT LISTEN AND LEARN

When a toy uses AI, it collects data such as voice recordings, interactions, and background sounds. This information is sent to remote servers, where it is analysed to improve responses. Your child's voice becomes training data, which may be stored indefinitely or shared with third parties.

### WEAK SECURITY PROTECTIONS

Some AI toys have poor password protection or open network connections. Others may have microphones or cameras that stay on, even when the toy appears to be off. This can lead to recordings being made without your knowledge, including conversations unrelated to play.

### ARTIFICIAL VOICES, REAL INFLUENCE

For very young children, an AI companion may become one of the first voices they interact with regularly. How that voice shows humour, empathy, or authority can shape how a child learns to communicate. If the model is artificial, then part of what is learned is artificial as well.

### PRESSURE TO KEEP ENGAGING

Some toys reward repeated use or track engagement, encouraging children to interact more. When children compare how their toys perform, it creates pressure to play more often. This increases the amount of data collected and can make learning feel like competition.

### MARKETING THROUGH PLAY

Toys that learn a child's preferences may feed that data into future advertising. A toy that knows a child's favourite colour or hobby could help a company design more targeted marketing to that child and their family.

### PLAYTIME AS DATA TRAINING

The information collected from children helps train AI systems. Their voice, emotional responses, and behaviour shape how machines 'understand' people. Play becomes part of a much larger system that influences how future technologies behave.

## Advice for Parents & Educators

### START WITH A CONVERSATION

Talk to young people. Explain that some toys learn from what they say and do. Help them understand that even friendly technology should have boundaries, and to ask questions about it. Curiosity is healthy, blind trust is not.

### SET LIMITS ON USE

Turn off Wi-Fi or Bluetooth when the toy is not in use. Check for updates regularly, as they can change privacy or safety settings. Treat connected toys like any smart device: they should be monitored, updated, and switched off when not in use.

### MODEL DIGITAL AWARENESS

Children learn from adults. If they see you checking privacy settings, reading terms, and talking openly about online safety, they are more likely to do the same. Show them how to question technology in a healthy way.

### RESEARCH BEFORE YOU BUY

Look for toys that work offline or store data locally. Check for a free or demo version so you can test how it behaves. Read privacy policies to understand what data is collected, where it goes, and whether it's shared with others.

### REVIEW PRIVACY SETTINGS

Find out where the data is stored and who has access to it. Some companies sell or share data with advertisers. If the toy connects through an app, check what it requests access to and limit those permissions whenever possible.

### BALANCE AI WITH REAL PLAY

AI toys can be fun and creative, but they are not a replacement for real human interaction. Encourage time away from technology with activities that foster emotional and social development. Use AI toys to support learning, not define it.


