Block 4 of our school curriculum year is already well underway and children have been experiencing some great learning opportunities, some of which you will read about below. Mr Lewin led an assembly at the start of the block to introduce our next inspirational person: Malala Yousafzai. One of Malala's many achievements include the skill of being able to **speak confidently**. Therefore this block, we are asking all children to try and work on that skill. You may see children arriving home with stickers and ACE slips that show they have been working hard in this area.

Amy came into school to conduct an assembly and lead the children with participating in some physical activity. Children (and staff) found this to be a really inspirational morning, as Amy was able to describe to us all how she suffered set backs in her career, but it didn't stop her working towards her goal. She really was the embodiment of our ACE values. The children were exhausted by the time they were finished, but all worked really hard! The purpose of the event was to raise money to support physical activity and mental well-being in schools and for athletes and para-athletes to con-

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Earthquakes, volcanoes and tsunamis have been a hot topic in **Year 3**. We have been exploring why tsunamis happen and we even made a model in groups. The children have looked at tectonic plates and how these create natural disasters and mountain ranges. This information has been vital for our recent independent writing: 'What is a Volcano?' The children thoroughly enjoyed writing these information leaflets and have used key ingredients in their writing such as: 'relative clauses', expanded noun phrases and formal language. In maths, the children have been consolidating their 4 written calculations and beginning to look at perimeter. The children have enjoyed using their 4 written methods with reasoning and problem-solving questions.

In Year 4, we have been learning all about changes of state. During our first few lessons of this science-based topic, we explored the three states of matter, the properties of each and sorted different materials into categories depending on whether they were a solid, liquid or gas. We even discovered that there are some unusual materials, which we were allowed to handle, like foams, gels and powders. They are unusual because they have properties of more than one state. We have discovered that chocolate has a slightly lower melting point than the temperature of the human body when we watched a chocolate button slowly melt in the palm of our hands. During this lesson, we learned about how temperature changes cause the processes of melting, freezing, condensing and evaporating, resulting in changes of state. There's lots more to come, including an experiment to see if we can affect the rate at which ice melts and creating chemical reactions when we design and make our very own bath bombs in design technology. In writing, we are currently discovering how to write an effective fictional conversation, which involves learning how to use direct speech to convey the character's thoughts to the audience. In maths, we have recently learned how to use short division to divide (including how to manage remainders) and have been exploring the wonderful world of fractions too. Haven't we been busy?

Year 5 have been learning all about play scripts this month and the children have been unleashing their inner Shakespeare. We have looked at various play scripts and it is clear that we have some very talented performers! In our topic this month, we are looking at another ancient civilisation - The Shang Dynasty - alongside scientifically investigating the various properties of materials. The children have also been eagerly putting ideas together for World Book Day, where we will be decorating our doors. Keep an eye out for any unusual requests for materials (if not needed at home) that could be useful for this event.

In **year 6** our topic is **Davy Lamp**, where we are learning about a significant time in British history the coal industry and how it fuelled the industrial revolution. We are learning about the timeline of the coal industry and important events within it, such as the invention of the Davy Lamp. This was a safety lamp designed by Humphry Davy, to reduce the risk of explosion and fire when working underground. Our lessons will teach us about how child labour was once part of the mining industry. We will explore the harrowing accounts of children who worked in the mines in 1842 and teach each other, through role play, their stories. Coal mining in Leicestershire spanned a timescale of eight centuries from about the year 1200 to 1991, when the last colliery, at Bagworth closed. This topic also provides us with an opportunity to connect with our own local history and we will learn about the Whitwick colliery disaster (1898). Conversely, as we use empathy and imagination to picture ourselves in the never ending darkness of the mines, we are also learning about light in our science lessons. Retrieving our previous learning from Year 3, we are building upon our knowledge of how light travels, to learn how we perceive colour and how light behaves when reflected. Finally in topic, we will complete a sequence of DT lessons on bridges and what materials and structures make for the strongest type of bridge. We will follow the plan, design, make and evaluate model to complete this.




