

Curriculum and Teaching


Rabbits Class The Oak



In Writing this term, we have shared many sensory stories for the children to participate in and to help promote their excitement and engagement for reading. We have encouraged the children to improve their handwriting by focusing on their finemotor skills and letter formation. Our English lessons have been based on the story 'Billy Goats Gruff'



In Maths we have been working on different number skills, this includes recognising numbers and representing these in different ways, counting to and from a given number and working on addition and matching skills.





Hedgehogs Class Reception Year

Hedgehogs This is Me!

Literacy:

We have started to learn our phonic sounds using the Read Write Inc scheme. We are beginning to blend words to help us read and segment words to help us write.

Mathematics:


The children have been practising matching and sorting objects based on attributes such as their colour, size and shape. They have also compared sets of objects and amounts using the language of more and fewer.

Understanding the World:

We have explored the similarities and differences between ourselves and others and to learn that there are different communities we belong to such as school, family and local communities.

People, Culture and Communities:

We have familiarised ourselves with the classroom and school environments and can describe key features of these areas. We have also been learning about people who help us.



We have explored the natural world around us and observed changes in the leaves as we entered Autumn.

Squirrels Class Year 1



In Geography the children made a map of the classroom in a creative way with four key features represented

way with four key features represented by different objects: beginning to use directional language to describe the location of features in the classroom. They used objects for their messy maps and decided on three features to add to



their map. In art the children were experimenting with a range

of mark-making techniques. They were encouraged to use a range of materials and draw using



big, wider arm movements. They controlled the materials more effectively and created more accurate work. This allowed them to develop greater detail in their drawing.

Badgers Class Year 2

This half term in Badgers Class we have been working hard and having lots of fun!

In English lessons, we have learnt about nouns, verbs and adjectives. We learnt how to use expanded noun phrases to make our writing more interesting. Then we went on to use this in our writing of a character description. This week, we are learning how to write a newspaper report.

In Maths, we have learnt about place value of numbers using our tens and ones. Now we are looking at addition and subtraction, still using our place value to help us.

During Science lessons, we learnt all about what different animals need to survive. We were surprised to find that they all need the same 4 things: air, water, food and shelter, but that these needs are met in different ways.

In Geography we learnt about hot and cold places around the world and thought about which we would prefer to live in.



We also enjoyed PE; learning to keep fit. Art was all based on maps and RE, when we learnt about giving thanks and how some people give thanks to God.





Attendance and Behaviour

Well done Squirrels Class with an amazing 100% positive behaviours this half term.



All our pupils across the whole school have settled into the new academic year and have been absolutely brilliant; accumulating an impressive 3,817 positive behaviour points! This equates to 97% positive behaviours across the school – a truly excellent accomplishment that we should all be proud of.

Attendance



Well done Hedgehogs Class with an amazing 95.3% attendance this half term.

However, our whole school attendance is currently 93.5%, which is below our target. During the recent Autumn Term Consultation evenings, class teachers discussed individual pupil attendance reports with parents. We are committed to improving our attendance, and this is everyone's responsibility. Our goal is to achieve 95% attendance for all pupils. To support this aim, I must emphasise a few critical points:

- Attendance is far more than just a number it is crucial for your child's overall development.
- Regular school attendance directly impacts your child's academic attainment, progress, well-being, and social skills. By working together, we can ensure our pupils have the best possible opportunity to learn and grow.


