What are Al Companions & Chatbots?

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is becoming increasingly common in children's digital lives. AI chatbots are computer programs designed to communicate like humans. Children may encounter chatbots such as ChatGPT (13+) or My Al on Snapchat (13+), as well as virtual assistants like Alexa or Siri. Some Al companion apps, such as Character.AI, are rated 18+. A simple search for 'Al Chat' in app stores reveals many apps that are not suitable for children, so checking age ratings is essential.

Why are they popular?

Al tools are popular because they can provide quick answers and ideas, help with homework and learning and they often feel conversational and easy to talk to. Used appropriately, Al can support learning and curiosity, but children need guidance for safe use.

Risks to be aware of:

- Over-reliance on AI, replacing real-life friendships or problem-solving.
- Inappropriate content.
- Misinformation, as AI can give incorrect or biased answers.
- Privacy and data risks.
- Image manipulation and deepfakes, which can be harmful and distressing.

Parents and carers can help by:

- Checking age ratings on apps and websites.
- Talking openly about Al and its risks.
- Encouraging children to question what they see online.
- Using supervision, plus parental controls on devices and broadband.
- Reminding children to talk to a trusted adult if something worries them.



WhatsApp Channels

Users must be at least 13 years old to use *WhatsApp*. If your child uses *WhatsApp*, it is important to be aware of *WhatsApp* Channels. Channels are a one-way broadcast tool used by companies and individuals to send updates to followers.



WhatsApp Channels can be found in the Updates tab. From here, users can view a wide range of channels, including some that may not be age-appropriate and could contain adult content.

Currently, it is not possible to switch off access to Channels, and there is no age rating associated with them. This means content must be accessed to fully understand what it contains.
