

WHAT WE HAVE BEEN LEARNING ABUT THIS WEEK			
BAHAMAS	This week in Cuba and Bahamas we have been continuing to explore our environment and settling in. We have been enjoying lots of sensory messy play. We focused on filling and emptying for maths and have done some super mark making. All of the adults are so proud of how well the children have come back and settled in to the new area and classes.		
CUBA			
HAWAII	This week in Hawaii class, the children started their topic Rainforest Explorers. We made our own rainforest in the classroom by discussing what we might see, hear and feel in a rainforest. The children then used google Earth to find out how far away we are from different rainforests around the world. The children have learnt the new word 'equator'.		
ANTIGUA	Wow, we have settled beautifully back into Antigua class! What a fabulous time we've had looking at what makes us special. We have talked about differences and what makes us unique, looked in mirrors and made some wonderful self-portraits. We have built lovely relationships, working together in a range of activities. We have enjoyed exploring different activities to promote our language building and fine motor such as threading, using pegs and lots of music and dance!		
ST LUCIA	I am so proud of the children this week in St Lucia, It has been their first full week at school! We have had lots of fun learning our first phonics sounds and painting them, drawing them and making them in playdough. We went for an adventure up to the field to collect leaves for our Autumn artwork for the horticultural show. We have had lots of fun getting to know each other this week and can't wait to see what we get up to next week! I have sent their reading packs home today, please can you return them every Thursday so they can be changed ready to be sent home every Friday.		
MALDIVES	Y1 has had a very busy week settling into the new timetable and getting year one ready. In English, we have been building up literacy skills to write a recount. In maths, we have been sorting and counting objects. In science, we named some materials and in geography we have been looking at different types of weather. In phonics, we are consolidating phase 3 and 4 before moving on to phase 5. We have been working hard in guided reading to develop our decoding skills. In PE, we have been learning how to play basketball and developing our knowledge in computing. Next week (now we are more settled), we will have our exciting hook so please watch out in next week's edition!		
NEW ZEALAND	This week in Year 2, some fantastic learning has been taking place. In English, we have been drawing our own dragons and learning lots of new vocabulary to describe them. We have learnt about statement sentences and expanded noun phrases as well as remembering our full stops, capital letters and fingers spaces! In Maths, we have been working hard on writing numbers up to 100 by counting in tens and ones. This is crucial in developing our understanding of place value. Geography came to life as we found a treasure map and a message in a bottle from a chief explorer! This immersive experience has captivated pupils and sparked interest for our upcoming geography topic of 'What a Wonderful World'. Our curious scientists have been investigating the use of different materials and have explored the classroom to find things made from metal, plastic, wood, paper, brick and rock. This hands-on learning has helped pupils gain insight into the applications of materials which we will continue to explore. It's been a week full of curiosity and adventure; I look forward to what the coming weeks have in store for us!		
MALTA	We have had a very busy week in Malta class this week! We have explored our new topics and very much enjoyed finding out about the Stone Age. We had a 'class campfire' . We sat round the fire, drank chocolate milk and toasted marshmallows whilst reading The Stone Age Boy. We discussed the similarities and differences between how people lived in the Stone Age and how we live today and created our very own 'Stone Age survival kits' thinking about what was really necessary to survive in those times. We also began our new science topic looking and forces and magnets and talked all about how pushes and pulls. In Art the children have also had the		

	opportunity to explore cave paintings and make their very own printing blocks so that we can create our very own Stone Age art! What a fantastic start to the year we have had!
GALAPAGOS	We have had a great start to the school year in Galapagos class and already working hard and showing our TRUST behaviours. In maths this week, we have been looking at place value and how to partition numbers in different ways. Last week we carried out a mini topic learning about the Galapagos Islands. After learning where the islands are, we found out some interesting facts and importantly, about the incredible wildlife. In English, we started exploring non-chronological reports and finding dinosaur facts.
ICELAND	We have had an amazing week getting back into our learning! We have started to look at our diary entries for The Day the Crayons came home. We have also started looking at place value all the way up to 100,000,000! As well as this, Iceland have also had their hook into their topic of Marvellous Maps. We did some orienteering where the children had to make a map of the playgroup and pin point certain objects and areas for other children to find. It's been a very fun, very busy week!
JAMAICA	This week in Jamaica class we have had a fantastic week exploring our new topic for the half term. On Monday, we started to look at classifying animals. The children went outside to explore the living things around them and started to recognise some similarities and differences between each living thing. On Wednesday, as part of our hook, we tasted food from South America as we began our journey across the Americas.

What is the Short Breaks programme?

With the support of local businesses, the Isle of Wight Council's Short Breaks team has curated lots of fun activities specifically for young people on the Isle of Wight, with disabilities and/or additional needs. If you want to participate and are eligible (see below) - you will need to complete a simple form to take part.

Can I do Short Breaks activities?

If you answer 'yes' to the following you are eligible to join in Short Breaks activities.

- I am eighteen years old or younger.
- I have a disability and/or additional need that means I need support to join in leisure and recreational activities.
- I live on the lovely Isle of Wight and/or go to school here.

Are there any other benefits?

Yes, if you are eligible for Short Breaks, you and your family can also use the caravan at Shanklin, which is equipped for people with disabilities. Find out more on page twenty.

SUPPORTING CHILDREN TO MANAGE CONFLICT EFFECTIVELY

Disagreement is a natural part of human interaction. This can seem particularly true when dealing with the sensitive issues that arise for secondary-aged pupils. This guide brings you 10 top tips which can help prevent conflicts arising or mitigate their impacts when they do.

INSPIRE RESPONSIBILITY

The best approaches to conflict resolution are restorative. This means that rather than adults imposing their own solutions on children who have had a disagreement, they should work with them. Allowing them to handle it can feel empowering to young people and will hopefully teach them to manage their own disputes as they move towards adult life.

2 ACTIVELY LISTEN

Remember to give every child the opportunity to voice their opinion, regardless of their age, stage of development, special educational needs, or other individual requirements. This can be done using a variety of different communication methods. For example, some children find it easier to express how they re feeling using pictures and drawings, while some prefer to write their ideas down.

3 BE CURIOUS

Demonstrating how to approach conflicts with a mature and empathetic mindset can set a good example to children, which can prove a useful skill for them later in life. Model this by asking inquisitive-yet-respectful questions about the issue at hand. Really try to understand where all parties are coming from, and share information between them when and where appropriate. This should encourage young people to mirror your behaviour, teaching them to be curious about the other sides of a conflict, and thus being more willing to hear them out.

PROMOTE DIFFERENCES

Children and young people may come from a range of different backgrounds and cultures or have protected characteristics which may cause them to see things from various angles. Having a school and community culture which celebrates and embraces diversity in all things - including diversity of opinion - means people are more likely to feel heard and understood.

5 BE SUPPORTIVE

Discussions may be sensitive or, in some cases, even trigger negative emotions. Pupils may have mixed feelings about the issue at hand. They could be nervous or anxious before even coming to the table to talk about it. Try and create a space where all parties feel safe, welcome and comfortable. Allow breaks and time-outs if the conversation gets heated, to prevent anyone from saying something they might later regret.

6 MENTALLY PREPARE

Think of how you can approach the conflict in a calm and regulated manner. Consider taking some extra time to prepare beforehand and finding somewhere quiet to relax. Even if you're not directly involved with the conflict, mediating can be a stressful experience in its own right. Make sure you're hydrated, fed and comfortable, and do the same for the young people involved. These may seem like insignificant factors, but it's important to remember that physical discomfort can trigger dysregulation, which can make it much harder to have a calm, productive conversation.

GET YOUR FACTS STRAIGHT

Ne

Make sure you have all the facts, figures and timelines of the situation prior to the discussion. This should be done as objectively as possible with the aim of resolving the ongoing issue. You may want to risk assess any problems that may arise and look for possible solutions during your preparation time.

8 STICK TO THE POINT

Make the reason for, and purpose of, any meetings or communications clear prior to setting them up. Provide an agenda. Act as a neutral chairperson who can keep all parties on track. Make sure everyone has a chance to air their concerns about the issue being discussed and try to avoid talking about unrelated incidents. Close off with some action points, detailing what everyone can do to resolve the conflict.

9 BE SOLUTION FOCUSED

It's often said that the art of diplomacy is about giving others ladders to climb down. This means the main aim of any meeting or correspondence should be finding mutually acceptable and amicable solutions. Parents, carers, teachers and pupils should be aware there may need to be a compromise for the common good – and, most importantly, the good of the children you're supporting.

DON'T IGNORE OR AVOID CONFLICT

No one benefits from allowing concerns and grievances to fester, as this can lead to further division and mistrust, and ultimately doesn't help the children involved. Use our tips to open meaningful lines of communication. These should help you find a suitable resolution and minimise the number of conflicts you're faced with mediating overall.




