WHAT V	VE HAVE BEEN LEARNING ABOUT THIS WEEK
CUBA	This week we have been exploring Autumn, we have enjoyed leaf painting and conker rolling. The children have enjoyed examining leaves, conkers and acorns in an Autumn tray. We have also enjoyed exploring different vegetables, we broke them open to scoop the seeds out. Some of the children liked to smell and taste the vegetables as well as touching them.
HAWAII	This week, Hawaii went on a class trip to Naturezones. We considered how animals live in different habitats and looked for these in the environment. We went pond dipping, went for a walk through the forest and picked apples for the birds. We had an amazing time!
ANTIGUA / ST LUCIA	The weather has changed this week just in time for us to learn all about autumn. We went on an autumn walk around the field to find signs of autumn. We found yellow leaves, red leaves and acorns. Reception class also had a visit from the school nurses and they taught us all about how to wash our hands properly. GALAPAGOS	What a great final week of the half term we have had! The children have been super busy this week drafting, editing and publishing their rainforest narratives. They have written some amazing stories and should be very proud of themselves. In maths the children have become experts at column addition, we have learnt to add across 10, 100 and 1000, as well as adding with numbers that have a different amount of digits. The children have finished their art project on sculpture by painting their papier mâché animal models and building their very own rainforest habitats. Lastly, we have finished our science unit exploring living things and their habitats by discussing which animals are classed as endangered and what humans are doing to recover these species. Have a fantastic half term!
JAMAICA	This week in Jamaica class, we have rounded off the half term by creating the Empire State Building as part of our amazing Americas topic. 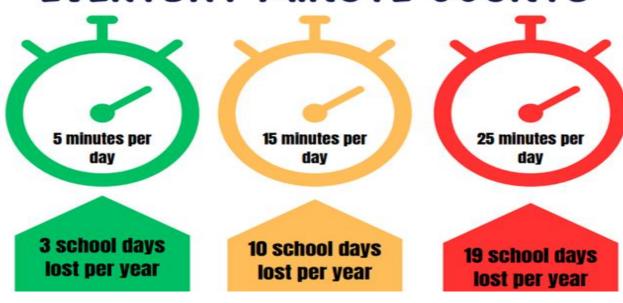



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

MEMES

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Memes may look like simple jokes, but, for many teenagers, they form a shared cultural language. Quickly created and reworked, they spread across social media platforms as images with text or short videos. Nearly eight in ten teenagers share memes (79%, YPulse), making them part of daily life. While memes encourage creativity and participation, they can also spread misinformation or reinforce harmful stereotypes.

SPREADING MISINFORMATION

White memors help to communicate complex topics, they can also spread misinformation. Memors may sometimes include content presenting tone facts or biosed viewpoints, especially cround health, politics, or current events ont, as they're designed to be should quickly, young people may not question their occurriery.

EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Memes are widely circulabled, and not ofways age: appropriate, meaning young people may encounter asplicit language, sexual content, or graphic imagery, even without searching for II. As memes apreed last on plotforms like instagram, TRTsk, or Whotskap, it's nearly impossible to filter them completely.

MASKED MESSAGES

Some memes are designed to be confusing or loyered with hidden meanings, making them hard for parents, and, sometimes, other young people to understand. Online groups often create these memes to look like inside jokes, but they can sometimes conceal offensive, harmful, or misleading content.

HIDDEN HARMS & LOSING SENSITIVITY

When serious topics the violence, nactamor mental health are turned into jokes, children ord young people may become less sensitive to these issues over time. While a funny meme may seem light-hearted, it can corry messages that heittle certain groups, encourage risky behavious, or mack personal struggles. Repeated expesses through memes can make harmful behaviour seem normal or less impartant. Over time, this can thur their understanding of what is funny versus what is also riminatory, harmful, or damaging to the members and others.

PERMANENT DIGITAL FOOTPRINT

Unities spoken joken, memes leave a trail. Created or shared memies can resurface later and be misunderstood, even if intended as harmiess. Once antine, memes may be capied, saved, or spread beyond a young person's central - digital actions can foliow them into their future, shaping how they are perceived by peers, teachers, or even employers long after the original meme has been shared.

Advice for Parents & Educators

ENCOURAGE OPEN CONVERSATIONS

Talk regularly with young people and try to understand their orders would discuss which they find funny placet the mames, and why. MODEL HEALTHY BOUNDARIES



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Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing.

As set down by the Department for Education, penalty notices can be issued for unauthorised absence. With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force for Penalty Notice Fines issued after 19th August 2024.

Per Parent, Per Child

Penalty Notice Fines will now be issued to each parent, for each child that was absent.

For example:

3 siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.

5 consecutive days of term time leave

Penalty Notice Fines will be issued for Term Time Leave of 5 or more consecutive days. INSET training days are school days and can be included in the 5 or more consecutive days where there was intent to be absent for term time leave.

10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10-week period

Penalty Notice Fines will be considered when there has been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period.

1 First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.

2 Second Offence

Within 3 years

The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

3 Third Offence

And Any Further Offence (Within 3 years)

The third time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case will be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in Magistrates' Court can show on the parent's future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

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Occupational therapy Parent advice sessions

The NHS Occupational Therapy Team will be running monthly parent advice sessions. These sessions are open to any families which don't have an existing referral.

The sessions will be with an Occupational Therapist and an Assistant.

The team will be able to give advice, signpost to other services / charities and support with completing a full referral to Occupational Therapy if it is felt the needs discussed require a full assessment.

The team will be able to support with advice around:

- Self Care tasks e.g. washing, dressing, using cutlery, toileting
- · Fine motor skill development
- · Play skills
- Preschool / school readiness
