WHAT W	/E HAVE BEEN LEARNING ABOUT THIS WEEK		
CUBA	This week in Cuba we have continued our transport topic. We have enjoyed exploring trains and building tracks while making various train noises. In Maths we have been matching cars and counting. The children have explored various cereals for sensory play and enjoyed threading Cheerios onto spaghetti. We have enjoyed the dry weather and lots of water play.		
HAWAII	This week in Hawaii class have started their topic on crime and punishment. The children learnt how crimes in historical Britain were treated differently compared to now. They have also made switches to complete their electrical circuits by using spilt pins and paper clips. Some children then explored how the circuit could be altered by added more cells or different elements.		
ANTIGUA	This week in Antigua our topic of the week has been transport. The children have enjoyed exploring our themed tuff trays where we've had an imaginary building site with roads, signs and diggers as well as lots of different sensory activities that involved sand, shaving foam and cereal. The children also used great turn taking in our car ramp station as well as great creative skills to make different types of transportation like a hot air balloon!		
ST LUCIA	This week in St Lucia we have continued our topic of transport, however this week our book of the week was Emma Jane's Aeroplane, we turned our roleplay area into an aeroplane. We made passports, boarding passes, tickets and luggage tags. We also explored where Emma Jane's aeroplane looked at the landmarks she saw on her journey, we looked at Big Ben, The Eiffel Tower, The Great Wall of China, Sydney Opera House and The Empire State building and wrote sentences on what country we would see these landmarks!		
NEW ZEALAND	In year 1 and 2 we had a super exciting visit to Nettlecombe Farm. We had a go at feeding sheep, cows, donkeys, chickens and goats. We tried feeding all of the animals from our hands and were all super brave!		
GALAPAGOS	Year 3/4 has had another busy week! In English this week the children have written some amazing narratives based on our class story 'Millions'. We have also started our new topic of 'money' in maths and the children have been very successful in recognising coins and notes as well as converting between pounds and pence. In science the children conducted their own experiments working predicting if a range of materials were electrical conductors or insulators. They then tested their theories by building their own circuits, the children have loved this topic so far! Finally, in PE the children have been practising their athletic skills, we have been playing games to work on our throwing, jumping and running techniques. Well Done everyone!		
ICELAND	This week in Year 5, we went to sea safe at Sandown beach with the Year 6 class. We learnt how to keep our body afloat and the different flags. In maths, we did decimals, adding tenths and hundredths. For English, we looked at a text about Macbeth which was our first Shakespeare book. In science, we did gestation periods for humans and animals. We also did squash with the year 6 class for our PE at Westridge. On Thursday afternoon we are going down to do an art rag wreath making out of scraps of fabric. Of course, in sailing there was some drama. Luke did a backflip off the boat! Fortunately, he stayed very safe and did not panic and luckily, he got back on the boat with an instructor who has lots of experience.		
JAMAICA	This week in Jamaica class we have continued our journey looking into the Shang Dynasty. This week, we focused on the hierarchal system for people living in the Shang. We drew a pyramid to represent the importance of different people living at the time. In maths, we have been exploring financial risks and have looked into how to avoid being in debt.

Whether you are looking for childcare for a few sessions or for the whole week, we are committed to ensuring your children are cared for in an environment where they will feel safe, happy and nurtured.

There is a range of funding available for children from 2 years old, it is really easy to check your family's eligibility for early years funding by visiting <a href="https://www.childcare.choices.gov.uk">www.childcare.choices.gov.uk</a>:

- 2-year-olds can get 15 hours of funding from the term after their 2nd birthday if you receive certain benefits (including Income support or Jobseeker's Allowance or if you receive Universal Credit, and your household income is £15,400 a year or less).
- Working families can, subject to eligibility, get 15 hours of funding for 2-year-olds.
- All children are entitled to 15 hours of free early years education from the term after their 3rd birthday.
- Working families of 3-year-olds can, subject to eligibility, apply for an extra 15 hours of funding, giving them a total of up to 30 hours.

If your child's birthday is before 31st August they could start with us straight after the Summer holiday.

# Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing.

As set down by the Department for Education, penalty notices can be issued for unauthorised absence. With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force for Penalty Notice Fines issued after 19th August 2024.

### Per Parent, Per Child

Penalty Notice Fines will now be issued to each parent, for each child that was absent.

### For example:

3 siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.

# 5 consecutive days of term time leave

Penalty Notice Fines will be issued for Term Time Leave of 5 or more consecutive days. INSET training days are school days and can be included in the 5 or more consecutive days where there was intent to be absent for term time leave.

# 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10-week period

Penalty Notice Fines will be considered when there has been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period.

# 1 First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.

# 2 Second Offence

### Within 3 years


The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.


# 3 Third Offence


### And Any Further Offence (Within 3 years)

The third time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case will be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in Magistrates' Court can show on the parent's future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

# What Parents & Educators Need to Know about CENERATIVE AI SAFETY

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Generative Al tools – such as ChatGPT – are now commonly used by children. In fact, 3 in 4 pupils in the 2024 Annual Literacy Survey reported using generative Al, up from just 2 in 5 the previous year. While these tools can boost learning and creativity, they also raise concerns around misinformation, privacy and overuse. This guide explores the key risks and how to support safe use.

ALL THE ANSWERS

### MISINFORMATION AND ACCURACY

✓ Real

Generative AI can sometimes produce false or misleading content. Children – and even adults – may assume the information is accurate and trustworthy. This can affect learning and understanding of important topics. It's vital to teach children to critically assess all information, even whose is consected.

## EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Because generative AI is trained on vast datasets from across the internet, there is a chance it may occasionally generate harmful or inappropriate content. Without supervision, children could encounter disturbing or unsuitable material. Active monitoring and clear usage boundaries can help reduce this risk.

### PRIVACY AND DATA SECURITY

Some Al tools ask for personal details or store users' interactions. If privacy settings are not correctly configured, children's personal data could be exposed or misused. Teaching good digital hygiene and setting strong privacy controls is essential for protecting children

# REDUCED CRITICAL THINKING

Relying too heavily on Al-generated responses may reduce children's willingness to think independently. If they consistently use Al to solve problems or complete tasks, it could impact their ability to reason, analyse and form their own ideas. Encouraging thoughtful reflection is key.

### DIGITAL DEPENDENCY

Regular use of generative Al can contribute to increased screen time and less real-world interaction. If left unmanaged, it may affect physical activity levels, sleep, and social development. Striking a healthy balance between online and offline activities is important for wellbeing.

### UNCLEAR ETHICAL

Children may not fully understand the ethical implications of using AI to complete homework or creative tesks. This can lead to unintentional plagiarism or dishonest academic practices. Conversations around responsible use and academic honesty are crucial.

## Advice for Parents & Educators

#### ESTABLISH CLEAR GUIDELINES

Set clear, age-appropriate rules for when and how generative AI can be used. Reinforce these regularly to help children develop a healthy, respectful and informed relationship with the technology.

#### PROMOTE ACTIVE SUPERVISION

Keep an eye on how the children in your care use AI tools. Check in regularly to ensure they're using them appropriately and be ready to step in if something doesn't feel right.

## ENCOURAGE CRITICAL EVALUATION Help children to question the accuracy of AI-generated inform

seek out additional trusted sources. This builds essential digital literacy skills and supports better decision-making.

### **ENHANCE PRIVACY AWARENESS**

Talk to children about the importance of keeping personal information private. Make sure privacy settings are in place and explain how data shared with Al tools could be used.
