#### **News from Brading CE Primary School**

Dear Parents/Carers,

Looks like Summer has disappeared and we are left with Autumn so quickly! Please can you make sure that, as the weather is so changeable at the moment, that your children have a waterproof jacket with them everyday so they can wear it during break times. Just a few reminders from last week.

- 1. As class teachers are so busy first thing in the morning getting things ready for learning and as we need to get learning started on time as there is so much to get through during the day, teachers are <u>not</u> available to talk to anyone before school or when they are bringing in their classes. Mrs Willshire or myself will be available from 8.30 to help support anyone.
- 2. Due to space in classes on pegs, please ensure your child has a foldable bag or drawstring bag we cannot have rucksacks.
- 3. Lunch boxes need to be plastic, please, Teachers will be checking lunch boxes and bags next week.
- 4. Fidget tools- Use of Fiddle Tools in School, Fiddle tools can be helpful for some students as a way to support concentration, focus, and self-regulation. From an Occupational Therapy (OT) perspective, when used appropriately, they provide a safe sensory outlet or subtle movement that can help a student stay engaged with learning and manage feelings of restlessness or stress. However, not all fiddle tools are suitable for classroom use. Some can be distracting, noisy, or highly stimulating, which can actually increase anxiety or disrupt attention. In these cases, rather than supporting regulation, they can make it harder for a student to focus or manage their emotions. To ensure that all students benefit safely, the school will provide appropriate fiddle tools to those who need them, tailored to each child's individual sensory and regulation needs. We ask that parents do not send fiddle tools from home, as the tools provided at school are carefully selected to support learning and self-regulation effectively. Thank you for helping us maintain a calm, focused, and supportive learning environment.
- 5. Diaries have all come home with information on our behaviour code, zones of regulation and TRUST breakdown. Our expectation is that they come in with the children everyday and we will check them. Please feel free to use them as a communication book as well.

I have been made aware that there have been various incidents taking place outside of school. As a school community we should all be working together and supporting each other at all times of the school day so that we can be a TEAM that TRUST each other. Let's enjoy all our time together as the Brading Community.

We are pleased announce that our Head Boys and Head Girls for this year are ALICE, IVY, ELLERSON and LUKE. Massive congratulations to all four of them and we look forward to seeing you all do so well in your new positions within school.



## Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing.

As set down by the Department for Education, penalty notices can be issued for unauthorised absence. With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force for Penalty Notice Fines issued after 19th August 2024.

### Per Parent, Per Child

Penalty Notice Fines will now be issued to each parent, for each child that was absent.

#### For example:

3 siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.

# 5 consecutive days of term time leave

Penalty Notice Fines will be issued for Term Time Leave of 5 or more consecutive days. INSET training days are school days and can be included in the 5 or more consecutive days where there was intent to be absent for term time leave.

## 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10-week period

Penalty Notice Fines will be considered when there has been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period.

## 1 First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.

# 2 Second Offence

#### Within 3 years

The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

## 3 Third Offence

#### And Any Further Offence (Within 3 years)

The third time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case will be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in Magistrates' Court can show on the parent's future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

# What Parents & Educators Need to Know about CONSPIRACY THEORIES

Conspiracy theories are false or misleading beliefs that explain events as secret plots, often involving powerful groups. While once fringe, they are now more accessible through digital media, online influencers and because of algorithmic recommendations. The DfE guidance document, 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' (KCSIE) explicitly recognises conspiracy theories as potential content risks. This guide will help parents and educators understand the risks, spot the signs, and build children's resilience to conspiracy theories.

#### WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

#### **UNDERMINING TRUST**

Conspiracy theories can lead children and young people to distrust democratic institutions and British Values, teachers, and even their own families and loved ones. This erosion of trust makes young people more vulnerable to extremist narratives by isolating them from reliable sources of information.

## ONLINE ALGORITHM TRAPS

Social media platforms can often recommend sensationalist content. Once a child engages with one conspiracy-themed video or post, algorithms push more of the same, thereby creating an echo chamber that can intensify their beliefs.

### MENTAL HEALTH IMPACT

Exposure to frightening conspiracy content, such as global plots, viruses, or government control, can fuel feelings of anxiety, paranoia, or hopelessness. For some young people, it can trigger prolonged distress or obsessive thinking.

## GATEWAY TO EXTREMISM

Conspiracy theories can often overlap with extremist ideologies. Narratives that blame specific groups, such as politicians, scientists, o particular ethnic groups, can groom children in ways that foster hate, bigotry, and radicalisation.

### CONFLICT WITH PEERS

Belief in conspiracy theories can lead to isolation or conflict at school. Children may struggle with peer relationships if they express these beliefs or become distrustful of others who disagree; sometimes, confrontation can even result in a strengthening of the belief in the conspiracy theory.

## ERODED CRITICAL THINKING

Young people influenced by conspiracies may reject evidence–based learning. This risks undermining their academic progress and weakening their ability to think critically, assess risks, or engage in healthy debate.

## I WANT TO BELIEV

## Advice for Parents & Educators

#### CREATE SAFE CONVERSATIONS

Don't mock or dismiss any questions that children and young people ask about conspiracy theories. Instead, create open, judgement-free spaces to talk. This strengthens trust and makes it more likely they will confide in you.

#### PROMOTE CRITICAL THINKING

Teach young people how to assess information critically. Encourage them to ask appropriate questions, such as: Who is telling me this? What evidence is there? What do other trusted sources say? Use real examples from current media to explain your answers and reasoning.

#### MONITOR DIGITAL BEHAVIOUR

Be aware of the content children are accessing, especially on platforms such as TikTok, YouTube, or Reddit. Use parental controls, but more importantly, maintain ongoing dialogue about online experiences and influencers.

#### REINFORCE RELIABLE SOURCES

Point children toward trustworthy and reliable sources of news and information in a variety of formats tailored to the young person's age. Build habits of verifying facts using reliable sources, and teach them how to spot misleading content.


