WHAT W	/E HAVE BEEN LEARNING ABOUT THIS WEEK
CUBA	In Cuba class this week we have enjoyed lots of water play in the shade to cool down.  We have started exploring the story of The Hungry Caterpillar and matching butterflies in a sensory tray. The children have really enjoyed the new sensory balls and we have started to make our outfits for Mardi Gras, we have made our ribbon streamers ready.
HAWAII	In Hawaii, we have been learning about time in maths. We have looked at digital and analogue clocks. In English, we are creating posters for our choice of locations. We added white to create tints in Art and Design. The children have created habitats for the insects they found outside of the classroom.
ANTIGUA	This week in Antigua we have introduced our new phonics sounds and activities. The children have really enjoyed learning the new sounds and getting to know the new activities! We have also been playing in the sunshine and have spent a lot of time in the garden talking about how things grow and what plants need to grow! We have had a lovely week!
ST LUCIA	This week in St Lucia we have continued our topic of Minibeasts and linked it to growing. We have been exploring the lifecycle of a butterfly, making symmetrical patterns on a butterfly, making minibeasts from junk modelling. We wrote a shopping list for The Hungry Caterpillar, we using adjectives to describe The Hungry Caterpillar and write a sentence as a challenge! In maths we have been verbally counting to 20 and beyond, the children loved sitting in a circle and counting everyone's legs, with support we made it to 100! We can't wait to finish off our minibeasts topic by going to Butterfly World!
NEW ZEALAND	This week in year 1 and 2 we started our magical mapping topic and went for a treasure hunt using the maps to track the treasure down. We all found the treasure which was 30 dojos each!! We then had the second session of our carnival workshop where we began making our costumes including rosettes, belts and printing on sashes.
GALAPAGOS	This week year 3 and 4 have continued to work on writing their diary entries based on our topic somewhere to settle. We have written a diary based on a day spent in the city. In maths we have finished our time unit, and have been working hard on understating how to convert between analogue and digital clocks as well and 12-hour clocks and 24-hour clock. In art we have explored mixing colours and linked this to our work in tints and shades from last week. We have continued our tennis lessons, starting to play games focusing on our accuracy and control. Finally, in science we have completed our unit on sound and explored sound proofing, looking at which materials are best soundproofing and then writing a letter to a band suggesting what material would be best to soundproof their studio. Have a lovely long weekend, and see you next week!
ICELAND	In Iceland this week we have been editing our creative writing about a futuristic delivery drone that is delivering parcels to indigenous people living in mountain ranges. In maths, we have created our own angles and measured them accurately with protractors before investigating reflex angles and angles around a point. We have had some excellent French and Art work this week too, both looking at our lives within school.
JAMAICA	This week in Jamaica class, we have been continuing to work hard in preparation for SATs. We have completed a range of practice papers and have worked in groups to complete different questions. On Tuesday, we had an art afternoon and looked at different printing and painting techniques.

### We have vacancies!

Now we have had the fantastic news that Brading Primary School is staying open, we are pleased to be able to offer places in our Early Years Provision starting after the Easter holidays. As an experienced 2 to 11 setting, we understand that the requirements of each child and each family are different and we offer a flexible early year's facility which has been designed to provide an individually tailored approach for you and your child's needs. Whether you are looking for childcare for a few sessions or for the whole week, we are committed to ensuring your children are cared for in an environment where they will feel safe, happy and nurtured.

There is a range of funding available for children from 2 years old, it is really easy to check your family's eligibility for early years funding by visiting <a href="https://www.childcare.choices.gov.uk">www.childcare.choices.gov.uk</a>:

- 2-year-olds can get 15 hours of funding from the term after their 2nd birthday if you receive certain benefits (including Income support or Jobseeker's Allowance or if you receive Universal Credit, and your household income is £15,400 a year or less after tax).
  - Working families can, subject to eligibility, get 15 hours of funding for 2-year-olds.
  - All children are entitled to 15 hours of free early years education from the term after their 3rd birthday.
- Working families of 3-year-olds can, subject to eligibility, apply for an extra 15 hours of funding, giving them a total of up to 30 hours.

If your child's birthday is before 31st March they could start with us straight after the Easter holiday, or if their birthday is between 1st April to 31st August then they could start in September.

# Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing.

As set down by the Department for Education, penalty notices can be issued for unauthorised absence. With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force for Penalty Notice Fines issued after 19th August 2024.

## Per Parent, Per Child

Penalty Notice Fines will now be issued to each parent, for each child that was absent.

#### For example:

3 siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.

# 5 consecutive days of term time leave

Penalty Notice Fines will be issued for Term Time Leave of 5 or more consecutive days. INSET training days are school days and can be included in the 5 or more consecutive days where there was intent to be absent for term time leave.

# 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10-week period

Penalty Notice Fines will be considered when there has been 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a 10 week period.

# 1 First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.

Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.



#### Within 3 years


The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.


# 3 Third Offence


#### And Any Further Offence (Within 3 years)

The third time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case will be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Cases found guilty in Magistrates' Court can show on the parent's future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

# 10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

Traffic-related incidents are a significant risk for young pedestrians and cyclists, so understanding road safety is crucial for children's wellbeing. While all road users share responsibility for keeping one another safe, this guide offers strategies for empowering young people to navigate the roads confidently and responsibly.

#### TAKE PRACTICE **JOURNEYS**

Making 'practice' journeys with children is a great way to help them stay safe, thereby modelling responsible behaviours and having road safety conversations as they prepare to travel independently. Add hazard perception activities like spotting electric vehicles – which may have a green number plate – and point out how quiet they are. Children learn by watching others; remind them that their peers might not always be the hest role models.

#### BE BRIGHT, BE SEEN

Visibility is lower during darker winter days, and drivers need to take extra care to look out for pedestrians. Wearing bright and reflective clothing can help make children more visible to drivers near roads. In poor daylight conditions, encourage children to wear light, bright or fluorescent clothing. When it's dark, wear reflective clothing or materials such as a reflective armband or jacket.

#### 3 EYES UP

Encourage children to look up and keep their eyes on the road. Teach them to constantly watch for traffic and practise double-checking the road before crossing – looking right, left and then right again.

#### LIMIT **DISTRACTIONS**

Where possible, devices like phones should be kept away from children while out and about near roads. If they're carrying devices, these should be put away until they've reached their destination. Children must also avoid playing with toys or being distracted by friends. If a friend wants to show them something funny on their phone, there'll be time for that once they've safely arrived.

#### 5 SLOW DOWN

Discuss the importance of waiting instead of crossing immediately. It can be tricky to judge the speed of traffic and spot obstacles that could cause a trip or a fall. For safety, children must stop and think before they get to the kerb and should always walk – not run – when crossing the road. They should avoid crossing until they're certain they have plenty of time. Even if traffic seems a long way off, it could still be approaching very quickly.

#### STOP BEFORE THE KERB

Teach children to stop before reaching the kerb – not right at the edge of it. Hallting before they get to the kerb allows them to see if anything's coming, whereas getting too close to traffic is dangerous. If there's no pavement, children should stand back from the road's edge but ensure they can still see approaching traffic.

#### 7 CROSS SAFELY

Children should always find a safe spot to cross the road, prioritising zebra crossings or pelican crossings, footbridges and subways. Find a place where they can see traffic coming from both directions. Avoid crossing near junctions, bends in the road, or obstacles that block their view, instead moving to somewhere they can see and be seen. Remind them to use their eyes and ears together when checking the road, as sometimes they can hear traffic before they can see it. Looking and listening while crossing helps them quickly spot traffic, including cyclists and motorcyclists driving between other vehicles.

#### PARKED **VEHICLES**

Crossing between parked vehicles is very dangerous. Teach children to use extra caution if crossing in this way, and, ideally, avoid it attogether. They should use the outside edge of a vehicle as if it were the kerb, waiting and checking for traffic before moving. They should ensure vehicles aren't about to move, by looking for drivers in the vehicles and listening for engines running – but remember that electric vehicles may move off silently. They should always make sure there is a gap between any parked vehicles on the other side, so they can reach the povement.

## REVERSING VEHICLES



Children must never cross behind a reversing vehicle – it's extremely dangerous. Remind them to look for white reversing lights and listen out for warning sounds. Can they hear the engine sound or a radio playing inside the vehicle?

# WAIT FOR THE BUS TO LEAVE



When getting off a bus, children must wait for it to leave before crossing so they can have a clear view of the road in both directions. This also allows them to see and be seen by other road users. Crossing near large vehicles is particularly dangerous and should be avoided.
