

Accessibility Plan

Vision Statement

Under the Equality Act 2010 schools should have an Accessibility Plan. The Equality Act 2010 replaced all existing equality legislation, including the Disability Discrimination Act. The effect of the law is the same as in the past, meaning that "schools cannot unlawfully discriminate against pupils because of sex, race, disability, religion or belief and sexual orientation". According to the Equality Act 2010 a person has a disability if: (a) He or she has a physical or mental impairment, and (b) The impairment has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on his or her ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities. The Accessibility Plan is listed as a statutory document of the Department for Education's guidance on statutory policies for schools. The Plan must be reviewed every three years and approved by the Governing Body. The review process can be delegated to a committee of the Governing Body, an individual or the Head. At DCPS we are committed to working together to provide an inspirational and exciting learning environment where all children can develop an enthusiasm for life-long learning. We believe that children should feel happy, safe and valued so that they gain a respectful, caring attitude towards each other and the environment both locally and globally. Whole school training will recognize the need to continue raising awareness for staff and governors on equality issues with reference to the Equality Act 2010.

The Accessibility Plan will be published on the school website.

Aims and Objectives

- 1. To increase the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the school curriculum
- 2. To improve the physical environment of the school to increase the extent to which pupils with a disability, medical condition or other access needs can access education and associated services.
- 3. Improve the delivery of information to pupils, staff, parents/carers and other members of the school community.

Our objectives are detailed in the Action Plan below. The Accessibility Plan has been developed and drawn up based upon information supplied by the Academy Trust consultations with pupils, parents, staff and governors of the school.

The document will be used to advise other school planning documents and policies and will be reported upon annually in respect of progress and outcomes.

We are committed to providing an environment that enables full curriculum access that values and includes all pupils, staff, parents and visitors regardless of their education, physical, sensory, social, spiritual, emotional and cultural needs. We are committed to adhering to the principles of the Equality Act 2010 with regard to disability and to developing a culture of inclusion, support and awareness within the school.

Our Accessibility Plan shows how access is to be improved for disabled pupils, staff and visitors to the school within a given timeframe and anticipates the need to make reasonable adjustments to accommodate their needs where practicable.

The Accessibility Plan relates to the key aspects of curriculum, physical environment and written information:

Curriculum

Increase access to the curriculum for pupils with a disability, adapting the curriculum as necessary. This includes teaching and learning and the wider curriculum of the school such as participation in after-school clubs, sports events, leisure and cultural activities or schools visits – it also covers the provision of specialist or auxiliary aids and equipment, which may assist these pupils in accessing the curriculum within a reasonable timeframe (If a school fails to do this they are in breach of their duties under the Equalities Act 2010). Teachers make adaptations to support children who have needs commensurate with Dyslexia.

Physical Environment

Improve and maintain access to the physical environment of the school, adding specialist facilities as necessary – this covers improvements to the physical environment of the school and physical aids to access education within a reasonable timeframe;

Written Information

Where needed, adapt the delivery of written information to pupils, staff, parents and visitors with disabilities, including Dyslexia; examples might include adaptations to hand-outs, timetables, textbooks and information about the school and school events; the information should be made available in various preferred formats within a reasonable timeframe.

Whole school training will recognise the need to continue raising awareness for staff and governors on equality issues with reference to the Equality Act 2010.

Current Good Practice

We aim to ask about any disability or health condition in early communications with new parents and carers. For parents and carers of children already at the school, we collect information on disability through medical care plans and SEND review meetings

Curriculum

Through planning for individual need, we aim to provide as inclusive an approach as practically possible. Some areas of the curriculum present particular challenges, for example: PE for pupils with a physical impairment, however all reasonable adjustments are made to support as full an involvement as possible.

The SENDCo provides additional support for pupils and supports teachers in implementing strategies for improving pupils' access to learning.

Physical Environment

The aim is to continue to enhance the environment to meet the needs of all pupils and ensure that they have access to all aspects of education offered by the school. Disabled pupils participate in extra-curricular activities. Some aspects of extra-curricular activities present particular challenges, for example: lunch and break times for pupils with social/interaction impairments, after-school clubs for pupils with physical impairments, school trips for pupils with medical needs. Information.

Different forms of communication are made available as needs are identified to enable all disabled pupils to express their views and to hear the views of others. Access to information is provided in a range of different formats available for disabled pupils, parents and staff as needed.

Access Audit

There is one building, on two storeys. All the classrooms (from EYFS to KS2) are on the lower corridor and this is accessible by walking down the driveway - this is step-free access. All KS1 and KS2 classrooms have step free access.

Reception and the upstairs offices are accessible over the bridge. There is a lift to the ground floor.

Fire doors are fitted with door guards so that they close automatically once the fire alarm is set off.

On-site car parking is available for staff and visitors and the school

There are disabled toilet facilities available in the reception area and on the ground floor opposite the hall.

The school has internal emergency signage and escape routes are clearly marked.

Management, coordination and implementation and review

- We consult with other professionals and services when new situations regarding pupils with disabilities are experienced.
- The Governors and Senior Leadership Team work closely with the Local Authority/ENGIE
- We work closely with parents to consider their children's needs.

Complaints

The school works, wherever possible, in partnership with parents to ensure a collaborative approach to meeting pupils' needs. If there are any complaints relating to the provision for pupils with access needs these will be dealt with in the first instance by the Headteacher. The SEND Governor or Chair of Governors may be involved if the complaint is not resolved satisfactorily.

Action Plan

Aim 1: To increase the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the school curriculum.

Our key objective is to reduce and eliminate barriers to access to the curriculum and to ensure full participation in the school community for pupils, and prospective pupils, with a disability, medical condition or other access needs.
