Whole School Strategic Drive – Safeguarding

As you will know from previous newsletters as a school we set specific strategic drives each year to support whole school improvements. One of our drives this year is:

To maintain a strong culture of Safeguarding by completing the National 360-degree audit and ensuring responsibilities and key information, including our Safeguarding curriculum, is clearly understood and supports the children and staff.



We are committed to helping our children understand what *safeguarding* means. Through regular lessons and assemblies, we support them in recognising when something doesn't feel right and knowing who they can talk to - both at school and at home - if they feel unsafe.

Alongside this, we are using the 360 Degree Safe tool to review and improve our online safety practices. This tool helps schools assess their current policies and procedures, encouraging collaboration, reflection, and continuous improvement in how we protect children in the digital world.

By using 360 Degree Safe, we're ensuring our approach to online safety is strong, up-to-date, and supports our pupils' wellbeing in all areas of school life.

Parents and carers are once again invited to support their favourite House Team in a variety of track and field events on **Friday 11th July**.


Order of events:

Aim High Day




Years 1 and 2 had a fantastic ‘Aim High’ Day last term. The poet Carol Rumble led an insightful and inspiring day on poetry.

Vehicles on School Grounds

We would like to politely remind our parents that there is no parking on site unless you are a disabled badge holder or have had a meeting with the Headteacher and a temporary pass has been issued. This excludes those dropping children off for Breakfast club or collecting children from after school clubs.

As you will understand, this is for the safety of all the children and those parents/carers/siblings walking onto the site in the morning and after school. Unrestricted access for cars can lead to an unsafe and chaotic environment, and also increases significant congestion that we must avoid to Safeguard all children.

We would ask anyone who drives onto site at any time to observe the speed limit of 5mph and to park in a safe and considerate manner.

Walking or cycling to school develops healthy habits and lifestyles and improves well-being for all. This also reduces pollution, creates a healthier environment and aligns with our drive for sustainability.




Parents have asked to be kept informed of our author focus so that they might share and read texts relating to what is also being done in school.

In May, the year 4s had an amazing residential experience at Braeside residential centre in Devizes.

After following our planned route and spotting the sights of Avebury, Silbury Hill and the White Horse, we arrived at the beautiful Braeside House for 3 days of exciting challenges.



We had lots of fun trying out the climbing wall and the different routes to the top, tackling problem solving activities in teams, braving the leap of faith after a tricky ascent to the top of the tower and learning to canoe on the canal.



On the Tuesday, we walked to Drew's Pond Woods where we spent half the day creating beautiful artwork inspired by Andy Goldsworthy and his use of nature, and the other half conducting scientific experiments in the streams, investigating velocity and identifying different creatures. Despite a torrential downpour and thunderstorm on the walk home, we all had a fantastic time!



After drying out and having a lovely warm shower, we took part in the annual Brook Field Talent Show where the children amazed us with their array of acts! It was a fantastic trip with memories of a lifetime made. The children did themselves and the school proud, taking on challenges, pushing themselves out of their comfort zones, being brave and encouraging and supporting others.



Year 2 Trip to Aerospace, Bristol

Year 2 had a very exciting start to this term. On the first day back, we had our trip to Aerospace, Bristol. The children were very excited!

After a little delay, to the start of our trip, we arrived in good time at the museum. We had mixed the two classes and split off into two groups. Miss Tovey's group went off to complete the Mars Rover workshop first, while Mrs Bickell's group went off to explore the Museum.



We discovered all sorts of things related to topic we have covered throughout the year. We found Amelia Earhart's goggles and hat, replicas of biplanes and even got to try on some of the clothing they would have worn.



The Mars Workshop was amazing! We had to learn how to programme a Mars robot. First, we needed to work out in which order the instructions needed to be, avoiding the rocks on Mars, to reach our destination, where our robot would take samples from Mars. We could then program the I-pad, which would then move the robot. We even got to add lights and sounds at the end of the instructions!



Finally, we saw Concorde. We got to walk through it and see the pilot's cockpit, where the passengers sat and were amazed that Concorde could fly from England to New York in 3 hours and 20 minutes! That's super fast!

In year 3, we made pizzas as part of our Roman topic for our DT and English learning. We made our own dough and then had to decide on our toppings. We then wrote a set of instructions in our English learning to show our understanding of how to make it and how to embed our taught grammar features.

Sport Report

Football dominated Term 5 with regard to sporting action. The football season ended for the Years 5/6 mixed team and there was a Football Festival for KS1.

Semi-Final Heartbreak

There was heartbreak for the football team on Friday 25th April, when we lost our Swindon PSFA Semi-final Cup match against Oakhurst Community Primary School, 1 – 0 at the Gerard Buxton Sports Association in Royal Wootton Bassett. Oakhurst have been one of the form teams in Swindon primary schools' football this season being undefeated in their league and County Champions. However, we gave a very good account of ourselves and everyone should be proud of how they played.

Oakhurst (managed by ex-Brook Field pupil and Sports Coach, Mr Parsons) had more possession and chances but we were never out of the game. With about five minutes to go, we conceded a soft penalty which was ballooned over the bar, when the penalty taker slipped and knocked the ball first with his standing foot, but we continued to hang on and battle hard. The heartbreak then came because we conceded in the final minute of normal time before it would have gone to extra time and penalties.

The goal was also slightly controversial. Mario, who had been a rock in our defence, gave a way a free kick when Oakhurst were breaking and their forward had got in behind our defence, was about to collect a long ball forward and go in one-on-one with Harvey. The free kick was swung in, their player had a clear shot and it looked like he couldn't miss. Harvey made a good save, the ball bobbed around, another shot came in, Harvey saved it again and then it appeared to be kicked out of his hand, pinged around a bit on the goal-line before finally being prodded into the net. Harvey and several of our players protested saying it had been kicked out of his hands and he'd been fouled. However, the goal was given as Harvey was not in full control of the ball with his hand not being on top of the ball and trapping it against the surface of the pitch. It was similar to the Aston Villa goal ruled out against Manchester United in their final Premier League game of the season! Whereas, Manchester United were very fortunate to get away with it, Brook Field were not!

We still had one last opportunity to get back level when we won a free kick (their player kicked the ball away to stop us taking it quickly) but couldn't quite get a clear shot away on goal before the final whistle blew. Oakhurst, overall deserved to go through to the final; although our team felt the bulk of the decisions had gone against us, this had no real bearing on the outcome of the game apart from the controversial winner!

Oakhurst played The Croft in the final (who beat St Mary's in the other semi-final 4 – 2) and lost 4 – 0 to them. Well done to Harvey, Zachary, Spencer, Jessie, Mario, Quinn, Luca, Dylan, Jimmy and Noah.

West Swindon League Season Final Two Fixtures Determine Overall Standings

Thursday 1st May: In a close match and with a much-changed team, Brook Field drew 1 - 1 with Even Swindon in our penultimate game of the season. James T, Mav, Yash and Riley came into the squad. Although it was close and played in a good spirit, there were two 'controversial' moments, where the correct decisions were made but defined the outcome!

Even Swindon scored first after about 6 minutes. Our defence was caught too far up the pitch and a long ball in behind us saw Even Swindon have two attackers against Harvey in goal. Their player was on the edge of the area when he got the ball, giving us no chance to recover. He ran through level to the penalty spot and crashed it into the left hand-side of the goal before Harvey had time to react. We dug deep and then slightly against the run of play equalised. A flowing, passing move down our left-hand side ended with a cross field ball to the back post where James was standing fairly free. He got the ball under control, momentarily stopped and then fired home with his left foot to draw Brook Field level. 1 - 1 and the team couldn't believe James had scored with his left foot! On 10 minutes, we had our first agreed drinks break due to the heat. Even Swindon came out with a clear tactic after this which nearly caught us out as we'd made a couple of substitutions.

The second half was where it got more controversial. 12 minutes into the second half and we won a corner. As the corner was swung over, an Even Swindon player threw his left arm at the ball and punched it out behind the goal. Unfortunately, our referee, didn't have a clear view of it as he was focusing on the goalkeeper and whether he was going to be fouled or impeded by our player. It was a genuine refereeing decision and he could only go by what he had seen. The Even Swindon player then told the referee that the ball had hit on the arm just below his elbow. Our referee was then even more in a dilemma as he hadn't seen the incident so couldn't give the penalty but wondered if he then could, as the player had said what he'd done! When he asked the player again where the ball had hit his arm, the player then pointed to the top of his shoulder! So, the referee went with his original decision of a second corner.

Further 'controversy' followed! Both teams had more opportunities to win the game, but within the final minute, our last substitution had been made and the game was petering out. The referee has the whistle in his mouth, when the ball goes back to the Even Swindon goalie. (Both goalies had big kicks on them and had nearly scored when their kicks bypassed all the other players and went straight through to the other goalie!) Everyone was looking at the referee as it was obvious he is going to blow the whistle to end the game as the attack has finished. At the very moment the goalkeeper's foot hits the ball, the final whistle was blown. It cleared everyone; Harvey makes a half-hearted attempt to catch it and then moves out of the way of it completely (having heard the final whistle) and the ball lobs over the top of him and curls away, bounces once and into the top corner of the net. Even Swindon were convinced they had scored. The referee could see as he blows the whistle, what was going to happen but the "goal" didn't stand as the final whistle had stopped before the ball went into the goal! Well done to Harvey, Spencer, Mav, Riley, James, Yash, Quinn, Luca, Jimmy and Dylan. Thanks to all the parents for their support.

Our final League game of the season was against Peatmoor on Thursday 8th May and meant that we had managed to complete all our fixtures with a day of the season to go. We won 3 – 0 with two goals from Spencer and one from Luca. It was a good close game with Peatmoor having some good moments and playing well without any substitutes and managing to thwart us for large parts of the match. Vedant, on debut, was voted for as '@man of the Match'. So, Brook Field ultimately finished in third place in the League and were beaten semi-finalists in the Cup. Thank you to all those who have played for the school football teams this year and to their parents or family members for their transport, support and encouragement.


