Recommended Reads


This term our recommended reads are based on riddles and problem solving. Riddles and problem solving are a great way of exercising your brain, whilst also having fun with friends and family.

We will be posting daily riddles on our school website, over the course of this term. We hope you enjoy solving them with your child, having fun and laughter along the way.



The following books will be available for the children to use in our library and where our riddles will come from over the course of this term:


Overall, it was a truly **worthwhile and enriching day**, further equipping staff with strategies and insights that will directly contribute to your child's **academic and emotional progress**.

Whole School Targets – we call them Strategic Drives

As mentioned in previous Newsletters there are a number of main targets that we are working on as a school this year which have been developed based on monitoring, data and survey results. In this newsletter we are going to share a bit more information about the Personal Development target.

Personal Development: To continue a targeted approach towards supporting emotional well-being and gain Gold Healthy School status.

This target was planned following our achieving Silver Healthy Schools status in 2023 for the second time. On this occasion, the focus was mental health and well-being, an element of strength at Brook Field, previously recognised by Challenge Partners. Aiming for the Gold award is our aspirational next step. The focus of our application is delving deeper into emotional well-being and mental health, making this more visible within classroom practice through the curious not furious approach.



Furthermore, following the pupil survey in April 2024, some of our children felt that they were unsure about how to help themselves to feel better when they feel sad, angry or scared and some were unsure that they could name different feelings and emotions.

We are working to support our children to know what to do if they feel upset, angry or frustrated by using the curious not furious approach which helps the children understand how they are feeling and why they are feeling that way. We have also provided staff with professional development to support the understanding and strategies for the curious not furious approach which recognises everyone needs to feel comfortable, connected, capable, that they count and are in control. If any of these needs are not being met, then behaviours change and we recognise that all behaviour is a form of communication.

We continue to run our bespoke well-being programme and focus on mental health and wellbeing across the school and use assemblies to highlight strategies to use to help manage emotion.



We have created an action plan using the Swindon Healthy Schools materials for the Gold Award and are also working towards renewing our Mental Health and Emotional Wellbeing Award which we gained in 2022.


The Importance of Good Attendance

Regular school attendance is essential for every child's learning, development, and overall well-being. The Department for Education (DfE) sets the expectation that all pupils should aim for at least **95% attendance**, with the national target being **at least 96%**. Research consistently shows that good attendance leads to better academic outcomes, stronger social skills, and increased confidence in learning.

When attendance falls below 95%, children may begin to miss key learning opportunities, making it harder for them to keep up with their peers. Even small amounts of lost learning time can add up, impacting progress across subjects. That's why, in line with government guidance, all the schools in the Blue Kite Academy Trust are introducing attendance monitoring letters to keep parents informed and offer support where needed.

Our aim is to work together with families to ensure that every child has the best possible chance to thrive at school. If you receive a letter about attendance, please see it as an opportunity to discuss any challenges and explore ways to improve your child's attendance. Your support is invaluable in helping us create a positive and consistent learning environment for all pupils.



Girls' Indoor Football Festival

On Friday 17th January, Brook Field Girls' Football team took part in the Swindon Primary School 5 a side Football Festival. This was an opportunity for the girls to play football in a non-competitive environment so that those who may not play for a team outside of school have a chance to experience matches. Our team consisted of Anayah, Grace, Katie, Willow, Emily, Lillie, Bella and Isla May played matches against Abbey Meads, Tadpole Farm C.E, Oakhurst and Even Swindon.

Our first match was against Abbey Meads where it took a while for the girls to get up to speed and were quickly 2-0 as the opponents had some very good attacking players and it was only 2, thanks to some goal keeping heroics from Emily. We grew into the game and Willow scored a breakaway goal at the second attempt after a good save by their 'keeper. We conceded late on trying to equalise, so it ended 1 - 3.

After a short break, we took on Tadpole Farm. Lillie struck first with a great counter attack and composed finish before Katie doubled our lead thanks to Lillie's quick thinking to take the 'kick in' whilst the other team weren't set. Katie soon after repaid the favour by playing Lillie in behind to grab her second. Bella and Isla May had some brilliant defensive moments in this game but Tadpole scored with virtually the last kick and the game finished as 3 - 1.

Oakhurst were up next and they started quickly, using speed and strength to get in behind several times, scoring twice but it could've been a lot more if not for Emily. After their second, Willow received the ball, ran through and scored straight away, before Lillie's endless pressure let her take the ball off the defender and smash it home to make it 2 - 2. Late on, Oakhurst hit a powerful shot that gave them the win and the game finished 2 - 3.

Our final match was against Even Swindon. Unfortunately, Mr Bartlett missed the first 2 minutes dealing with an injury but heard 3 rounds of celebration as Willow had scored 2 and Lillie got one for herself. Some positional tweaks gave a chance for Grace and Anayah to shine and produce their best performances, resulting in Anayah squaring a beautiful pass to Grace who scored her first goal. As per the norm we conceded with the last kick of the game but we came out victorious 4 - 1.

The results were not important as every girl from every team had a beaming smile on their face. The girls did themselves proud and have set themselves up well for our cup campaign that kicks off next week. “Player of the Festival” could go to any of the eight; however, due to her making a ridiculous amount of top-quality saves, it was awarded to Emily.

St Mary's RC v Brook Field – Girls' Cup Match

The team of Emily, Grace, Katie, Anayah, Willow, Lillie, Isla May and Jessie headed to St Mary's RC for our first game of the Girls' Cup this year and it probably proved to be the most exciting game too.

Mr Bartlett won't describe every goal in detail as the report will never end(!) but here is a summary. St Mary's scored early going 0 - 1 up before Jessie struck a quick-fire hat trick to put us in a commanding 3 - 1 lead. Jessie then scored a fabulous solo goal to put us 4 - 1 up before the St Mary's goal scorer got her second to make it 4 - 2. Jessie bagged a fifth after great battling by Katie before the St Mary's striker got her hat trick making it 5 - 3 at half time.

St Mary's started the second half quickly and their striker got her fourth, Jessie however not to be outdone replied with her sixth goal making it 6 - 4. Despite heroic pressure from Lillie, Willow and Grace, last ditch defending from Isla May and Anayah and crucial saves from Emily, the St Mary's striker got her fifth and sixth goal to tie the game up 6 - 6. The Boys' team also had two matches in Term 3.

Brook Field v Robert Le Kyng (RLK) – West Swindon League

Robert Le Kyng has been our "bogey team" for the last two seasons with us usually playing really well against them, creating lots of chances but still losing 1 - 0 or on penalties.

RLK has lost all their matches this season but it was hard to tell in the first half as they harried and chased and pressed everything. They were tall and strong on the ball and were first to every ball, with high energy. However, it was a different story in the second half, as immediately after the interval, Quinn won the first tackle of the second half within seconds of RLK kicking off; Jimmy pressed high and won a throw-on and a better tone was set for the remaining last 20 minutes.

Our first goal about 8 mins into the second half was quality. A sweeping, passing move down the right saw Quinn pass to Jimmy playing up front; Jimmy down the right-hand side of their penalty area played the perfect ball across the area and put it on a plate for Spencer arriving unmarked in the middle of the goal to score from three yards out into the bottom left-hand corner. We played some delightful football at times in this period of the game with one touch passing and movement taking RLK players out of the game. About 18 minutes gone in the second half and we scored a slightly fortuitous second. Spencer took a corner from our right and it was eventually cleared back out to him roughly on the outer right-hand corner of the area. He took a shot-cum-cross right into the middle of the 6-yard area (not that we've got a 6-yard area at this level but you get the idea!), a tall defender tried to stick out a leg to clear it behind but unfortunately steered it into the bottom left hand corner past the goalie stranded in the middle of the goal. 2 - 0. Thanks to Mr Bartlett for coaching the team and refereeing the Cup match against Colebrook. The match was played a couple of days late due to the waterlogged Brook Field pitch.
