Parking -

A Message From David Walker, One of Our Governors



David Walker - Governor for History and Health & Safety

I joined the Elangeni board of governors in June 2021. I was immediately impressed by the positive changes that had taken place in school environments during that time and this motivated me to become more involved and apply for the position of governor at Elangeni School. Joining during the Covid pandemic made initial contact with staff and pupils quite challenging but, I was given fantastic support by the other governors and school staff. There are also good IT systems in place that help governors with training, meetings and documentation.

My two areas of responsibility are history and health and safety. Having studied history at university this was a particular bonus for me and I have enjoyed many entertaining discussions with Miss Mallard on a range of topics...all the way from Vikings to Shirley Bassey! I am also fortunate to work closely with Mr Sifleet, the site manager. We conduct termly inspections of the school to ensure the fabric of the building is sound and that the school environment is as safe as possible. Mrs Sifleet's dedication to this is very reassuring.

On my recent visit to the school for the 50th anniversary I was lucky enough to be given a tour by two members of year 6. Part of the role of a governor is to review the strategic direction of the school and the attainment and progress of pupils. The 45 minutes I spent in the company of my guides gives me confidence that this is in very good hands. The children are not only bright, enthusiastic and confident but also display an intelligent sense of humour that is testament to a warm and welcoming school environment. Walking between classes it is also evident that standards of behaviour are very high.

The many challenges facing modern education are well known and regularly fill the pages of the national press. I feel this often detracts from the hugely positive steps and inspirational moments that are part and parcel of daily school life. The Year 3 Christmas Extravaganza in 2022 would be just one example of this at Elangeni and it remains a particular favourite of mine. Volunteering as a governor brings its challenges but it is also hugely rewarding. The fact that my introduction to this was at a school like Elangeni has only improved that experience.
