As we come to the end of another year I wanted to thank you for your support of the school, all of our staff and the whole community around the school. Ms. Kondo and her whole team have worked very hard to engender a sense of community around the school and this culminated in a very tangible way with the Summer Fair which was organised by the school and supported by you. As well as being a very enjoyable day the Fair also raised a significant amount of money which will be used for the benefit of all our pupils. We had a great year with many high notes including the introduction of iPads to enhance learning. I am sure you will agree with me that this has been welcomed by the children and the early indications are that it is improving their learning. We will be continuing to build on this next year.

I would also like to highlight one project that I am passionate about which is Oracy and on a recent visit I was very excited to hear and see how it has become embedded throughout the school and has been embraced by all the teaching staff. The ability to communicate effectively and with confidence is a vital skill throughout life and one that has to be learned at an early age. THERAPY

As we come to the end of the school year, we would like to take this opportunity to thank **Mrs Cunningham, Mrs Cohan, and Mrs Pearce**, who have been leading our educational psychotherapy service during **Mrs Ahmed's** maternity leave.

Mrs Cunningham has been with us three days a week and has run the Safety T-Spot with great care and calm. She has led assemblies, written reports for governors, shared weekly wellbeing tips in our newsletter, held coffee mornings, and provided both one-to-one and group support for children. She has been a kind and reassuring presence in school, always ready to support pupils and staff alike. We are very grateful for her contribution this year. Although Mrs Cunningham will not be continuing with us in the same role next year, we hope she may return for one day a week in the autumn term.

Mrs Cohan has supported the school every Friday, working one-to-one with some of our most vulnerable children. Her role has been especially important when siblings or larger caseloads have needed additional support. Mrs Cohan will not be continuing with us next year, and we thank her sincerely for the care and dedication she has shown.

Mrs Pearce has brought new ideas and energy to the team, working with us on Wednesdays. She introduced the Wellbeing Champion Training, led a parenting course, and even organised our first-ever parents-only outing, which she managed single-handedly with 18 parents. She has also provided one-to-one support to children in moments of crisis, offering immediate and compassionate care.

We are pleased to share that **Mrs Pearce** will be joining us full-time in the autumn term. After more than 17 years in her current primary school, she has decided to focus more fully on her therapy work, and we are excited to have her as part of the West Acton team. While **Mrs Ahmed** remains on maternity leave during the autumn term, **Mrs Pearce** will be leading the Safety T-Spot and continuing the many wonderful initiatives we've introduced this year, including assemblies, newsletters, wellbeing support, and parenting courses. **Mrs Ahmed** plans to return in the spring term.

We are extremely grateful to **Mrs Cunningham, Mrs Cohan, and Mrs Pearce** for all they have done this year to support our children, families, and staff. They have each made a lasting difference.

Dear Parents/Carers,

Re: No smart phones for pupils from 1st September 2025

I am sharing with you this letter which has been created for all Ealing schools who are concerned about the impact of smartphones on our children. Attached to the back of this letter is the list of schools who are committed to becoming smartphone free by September 2025. Many high schools are also smart phone free.

Smartphones are a big part of life today. Most adults have one and they are great for finding information and staying connected with family and friends.

However, there is now evidence of the negative effects of smartphones and social media on children and teenagers. These include:

- Poor mental health, such as depression and anxiety
- Issues with attention and sleep
- Risks of cyberbullying and exposure to harmful content like violence or inappropriate material
- Smartphones can be addictive and distract children from learning important life skills

Children often get their first phone in primary school and over 90% of 12-year-olds have a smartphone. This period is crucial for brain development and the younger a child gets a smartphone, the more potential harm it can cause.

Schools have a role in changing how children use smartphones.

First, we are committed to making our school environments smartphone-free. Children cannot use smartphones during school hours and we do not want your child to bring a smartphone to school.

Second, we encourage you to delay giving a smartphone to your child until they are at least 14 years old. A growing number of parents and schools across the country are choosing to do this. There is widespread support from Ealing headteachers. If you need to contact your child while they travel to and from school, a simple 'brick' phone is enough. 'Brick' phones do not have internet connectivity and they are inexpensive.

From 1st September 2025 smartphones will not be allowed into school at West Acton Primary School. After an initial check by the class teacher, children will be responsible for their own phone, keeping it in their school bag during the day. They will not be allowed to use it at any time during the school day.

For those parents who wish to track their children's journey home, there are other ways this can be achieved. A number of children use an electronic tag attached to the inside of their school bag, which allows parents to know where their child is at any time.



As Primary Head Teachers, we have committed to promoting our own schools as being 'smartphone free'.

We would like to work together with parents on this issue. Together, we can make a big difference in our children's lives. I will address this issue at my Headteacher's presentation before the end of term however please do contact me on admin@west-acton.ealing.sch.uk if you have any questions.

This week's Tip from Mrs Cunningham School Therapist

How to nurture connection and make the most of the summer holiday as a family.

The summer break has arrived, offering a wonderful opportunity for you to create special memories and strengthen your bond with your child/ren. The aim is to create a healthy balance, enough activities to stay engaged, without packing your days so full that it becomes overwhelming.

It is also important to remember that transitions can be challenging. After a long school year filled with stress or pressure, children often need time to unwind. Also be aware that transitions take time especially after a year of built-up stress or tension from school, your child/ren may decompress into a meltdown or a few tantrums before they can fully settle into a change of routine.

Top tips for parents and carers to support this transition:

- Try to build in time for shared joy and connection. Laughter and gentle, playful activities like safe rough-and-tumble games can help release tension for both of you.
- Children still benefit from having some structure, even during summer. A steady routine each week gives children a sense of security and helps them feel more prepared for what lies ahead.
- Make sure there is space for downtime too. Quiet unstructured time allows children to explore their own creativity and learn how to manage boredom. A fun idea is to create a boredom buster jar filled with activities that your child/ren can pick from when they feel bored.
- Consider setting clear times for technology use rather than letting screens fill every spare moment.
- Finally, as summer draws to a close, you might enjoy looking back on your adventures together. Try making a photo album or a memory book filled with drawings of your favourite summer moments.

Final word... Thank you to all the parents and carers who came along to my Headteacher's Summer Presentation—it was lovely to share, in particular, the many celebrations and successes we've enjoyed as a school community this year.

As we reach the end of the academic year, I want to take a moment to reflect on what has truly been a special year at West Acton.

We've seen our community come together in so many ways—during moments of joy and, at times, sadness too. Together, we've created new memories for our children: the relaunch of our Summer Fair, the excitement of Sports Day and the many trips, concerts and competitions that have brought learning to life.

We have made fantastic progress this year in developing our pupils' oracy skills—that is, how they speak and how they listen, how they interact with one another and how they express themselves confidently in public. This growth has been especially evident in our class assemblies, school performances and the way pupils contribute to discussion and debate across the curriculum.

Alongside this, our digital strategy continues to grow from strength to strength. Integrating educational technology into the classroom has allowed pupils to explore their learning in creative, exciting and responsible ways. Their sensible, thoughtful use of technology has been a real strength this year and it's been wonderful to see their enthusiasm for new tools and approaches.

This final week alone has captured the spirit of our school beautifully: the fantastic Year 6 show on Tuesday, our whole school singing together on Thursday, and today, the moving Year 6 Leavers' Assembly and the traditional Leavers' Arch. These events remind us of just how much our children grow and flourish during their time with us and how quickly time passes.

Throughout the year, the children have worked incredibly hard, showing pride in their learning. We've seen some of the highest levels of homework completion and a genuine awareness of the importance of good attendance and punctuality. Pupils are wearing their uniforms smartly—many making good use of our second hand uniform shop—and upholding our school values of courage and consideration. The majority of parents have supported us consistently and I thank you for working in partnership with us to give your children the very best experience at school.

Our SATs results this year are broadly in line with the national average, with writing just below. I know our children will rise to this challenge, especially through my Summer Writing Challenge—I'm really looking forward to reading their entries.

Today, we've said goodbye to some wonderful members of staff who have been a valued part of our school community. We also say goodbye to our fantastic Year 6 pupils. We know they will flourish at high school and that everything they have learned here will stand them in good stead for bright, bright futures.

West Acton continues to be a special place because of the people who make up our school—from across London and around the world. That richness of culture and experience and the sense of togetherness it creates, is what truly makes our school unique.
